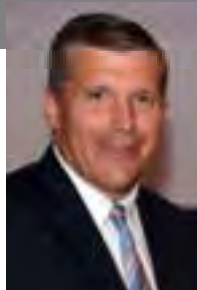

Grass-Roots Effort Leads Warriors

Though it may very well look like a fun play on words, Grass Lake girls basketball coach Andrea Cabana has established quite a culture in the small town located just east of Jackson. And it's really beginning to pay off.

"It's a grass-roots, fundamental approach to changing the overall culture of the program," she said. "We're very in-tune to the younger kids in the Junior Warriors (program), throughout the middle school to JV and varsity. It's a full program effort to keep everyone involved."

On Friday, she and her Grass Lake team took another step in keeping everyone involved, capturing the school's first girls basketball state championship. The Warriors overcame an early seven-point deficit and held off a late charge by Kent City for a 52-50 victory in the Division 3 Final at the Breslin Center.

Trailing by 10 points with just more than five minutes remaining in the game, Kent City went on a 10-2 run to nearly dissolve Grass Lake's lead. Seniors Kenzie Bowers and Jenna Harrison hit back-to-back 3-pointers to get their team within four points at 46-40. After a Lauren Pongracz layup put it back to a six-point advantage for the Warriors, Harrison hit another 3 and Bowers hit one of two free throws to make it a 46-44 game, in favor of Grass Lake.

The two teams would trade baskets before Grass Lake junior Lexus Bargesser hit a pair of free throws with 35 seconds remaining to give her team a four-point lead. She added two more with 10 seconds left to essentially seal the victory for her team.

"I feel so proud of our team and how we pulled through and didn't let the pressure get to us," Bargesser said. "Truly, this is the best thing that any basketball player could imagine happening to them. To be able to go and say you won a state championship is truly such a blessing."

Kent City entered the game unbeaten at 21-0 and jumped out to early leads of 16-9 and 21-17 thanks in part to its 3-point shooting. The Eagles shot nearly 40 percent from beyond the arc, hitting 11 of their 28 attempts.

They also played well defensively early on, keeping Grass Lake's two leading scorers, Bargesser and Abrie Cabana, in check.

"The girls executed the game plan absolutely perfectly," Kent City head coach Scott Carlson said. "We wanted to take away (Bargesser) and

(Cabana) and we did that in the first quarter, the first half really. But they had some players hit some shots that we were going to make them shoot."

Bargesser finished with 16 points and 10 rebounds and Cabana had 10 points to go along with her five rebounds. Junior Gabrielle Lutchka hit four 3-pointers and scored all 14 of her points in the first half.

Harrison led Kent City with 16 points, while Bowers chipped in 13.

"We had a great season," Carlson said. "These girls played absolutely fantastic. They overcame a lot and worked their tails off all offseason on their own when we couldn't get together. I couldn't be more proud of them."

For Grass Lake, the championship is a culmination of five years of growth in the program, a program which Coach Cabana took over five years ago. The Warriors faced one of the toughest schedules in the state this season, which helped prepare them for the Finals.

"We intentionally had a very tough schedule," said the coach, who now has a 95-18 record in five years with the program. "Our philosophy is we want to see the best. We want to see how good we are. We want to be pushed to our limits. Teams like that will expose every weakness that you have. So we were able to work on the things that needed to be adjusted before big games like this."

Grass Lake also captured its first Regional title, having fallen just short a couple previous times under Cabana.

"Our program has definitely been on the rise the past couple of years," Lutchka said. "We had a team make it to the Regional Final and (it) ended up not winning, so we've been trying to get past that point. Every year, we've gotten better and better and better."

And this year, the Warriors reached the basketball summit.

"It's huge for the girls within the program, something to build on and keep focusing on," Cabana said. "It's huge for the district. We've never won a basketball state championship at Grass Lake, and I think it's huge for the community."

Hudsonville 65, Detroit Renaissance 61

To say Hudsonville's Jaci Tubergen and Alaina Diaz were locked in during the 2021 Division 1 Final would be an extreme understatement.

One of them went on an 11-0 personal run, while the other had ice water in her veins during a three-minute stretch that helped her team fend off Detroit Renaissance, 65-61, to capture the first girls basketball title in school history.

"To see shots go in, it's a good feeling," said Tubergen, who finished with a game-high 28 points. "I'm lucky to have teammates who are willing to drive in and draw the defenders."

Tubergen would finish with 16 points in the third quarter alone, as the Eagles saw a one-point halftime lead balloon to 14 points heading into the fourth.

But Renaissance wasn't finished. The Phoenix scored the first 12 points of the fourth quarter to cut the Eagles' lead to two points at 54-52. Senior Shannon Wheeler had three steals and senior Mikyah Finley had two. Senior Kailee Davis had five of her team-high 26 points over that stretch.

The Eagles weathered the storm. Moments after missing the front end of a one-and-one, Diaz calmly stepped back up to the line and sank a pair of free throws which gave her team a 56-52 lead with 2:44 to play. Those were the first points of the fourth quarter for Hudsonville.

Diaz wasn't done. She would go on to make six more free throws without a miss to help her team pull out the victory.

Portland 52, Newaygo 32

Through almost three quarters of the 2021 Division 2 Final, only three Portland players had scored.

But the work of juniors Alivia Densmore, Ava Guilford and Ashley Bower was enough to carry the offense as the Raiders (20-2) racked up a 52-32 victory over Newaygo.

Bower led Portland with 20 points, while Guilford and Densmore chipped in 12 each. Earlier in the season, Bower went over 1,000 points for her career and set the school scoring record.

The Raiders trio combined for 40 points through three quarters as Portland built a 42-25 lead against the offensively-struggling Lions (21-2), who didn't have a player reach double figures scoring.

After Bower scored the first four points of the game, the Lions went on an 8-0 run. But Densmore hit a floater in the lane as the first quarter ended to give the Raiders a 9-8 lead.

Portland started hitting an offensive stride, and Densmore hit another buzzer beater to send the Raiders to the locker room with a 20-12 cushion.

Starting the second half, the Raiders got a triple from Guilford – the team's sparkplug – a three-point play from Bower and another triple from Guilford to push the lead to 29-12.

Newaygo senior guard Anna Brummel hit consecutive 3-pointers and Jaylee Long added a third to trim the deficit to 35-24 at 3:11 in the third quarter. But the Lions would get no closer.

Fowler 54, Bellaire 20

Fowler certainly is a small town. Located just 30 miles northwest of Lansing, everyone in town knows everyone. And if they didn't already know the Riley sisters' prowess on the basketball court, they sure do now.

Sisters Mia and Emma Riley combined to score 34 points in leading Fowler to a 54-20 victory over Bellaire in the 2021 Division 4 title game, Fowler's first MHSAA championship since 1991.

Emma Riley, a sophomore, scored the first four points of the game and her older sister, Mia, scored her team's first nine points of the second quarter as Fowler overwhelmed Bellaire early on. Fowler led 29-7 at halftime. It shot 48 percent from the field while limiting Bellaire to just three field goals and 12 percent shooting.

Fowler's defense played a big part in Bellaire's shooting woes. George's team collected 12 steals and forced 18 turnovers in the game. The Riley sisters accounted for eight of those steals.

Mia Riley, a junior, was 6 for 8 shooting in the first half, while Emma was 3 for 5. Emma Riley said she didn't let the arena atmosphere get to her.

"(Coach) always says if you get an open look, shoot it. So nothing changed on this court," Emma said.

Mia Riley finished with a game-high 18 points to go along with five rebounds and three steals. Emma Riley had 16 points, seven rebounds and five steals for Fowler (16-4).

To say that American female athletes dominated the recent Olympics in Tokyo would be an understatement. Among the 66 medals earned by American female Olympians – most by any country in the history of the Games – were gold-medal performances by the U.S. basketball, volleyball, water polo and beach volleyball teams. Eighteen medals were earned by the U.S. women swimmers, female track and field athletes claimed 15 medals, and the U.S. women’s softball and soccer teams won silver and bronze medals, respectively.

In the past 30 years of the Olympic Games, the United States has dominated the women’s team sports of basketball (nine golds), soccer (four golds, one silver, one bronze) and softball (three golds, two silvers) — not to mention the untold number of medals in track and field. And this past summer, the U.S. women’s volleyball team claimed its first gold medal.

These performances by some of our nation’s most skilled female athletes never would have been possible without the passage of Title IX and the offerings of these sports through our nation’s schools. With the chance to play afforded by the landmark Title IX legislation in 1972, girls participation in several high school sports skyrocketed in the years that followed.

When the NFHS conducted its first participation survey in 1971, basketball and outdoor track and field were the primary girls sports, comprising about two-thirds of the 294,000 total. However, with the opportunity to play additional sports, girls flocked to volleyball and softball first, along with cross country and eventually soccer.

Soccer, in fact, has had the most remarkable growth. In 1971, only 700 girls were playing high school soccer. Twenty-five years later, that number had climbed to almost 210,000; and as the 50th anniversary of Title IX approaches, there are now almost 400,000 girls playing high school soccer – a staggering 56,200 percentage increase in 50 years. Soccer now ranks fourth in popularity among girls high school sports – all because of that opportunity in 1972.

There are many other success stories, however. The pre-Title IX survey in 1971 indicated that 1,719 girls were participating in cross country. With increases every year until 2015, today, there are 219,345 girls competing in high school programs and the sport ranks sixth in popularity.

Although participation numbers have leveled a bit the past 10 years, fast-pitch softball is another sport that flourished after the passage of Title IX. With fewer than 10,000 participants in 1971, the numbers quickly rose to 220,000 by 1985 and 343,000 by 2000, and softball is currently fifth among girls sports with 362,038 participants.

Since track and field and basketball were the primary sports in the early days of girls sports programs, increases in those sports have not been as dramatic; however, they remain the first and third most-popular sports, respectively,

Scholar-Athlete Class of 2022

The Michigan High School Athletic Association/Farm Bureau Insurance Scholar-Athlete Award has been recognizing the top student-athletes for 33 years. Applicants for the Scholar-Athlete Award must meet the following criteria: A minimum cumulative grade-point average of 3.5 on a 4.0 scale; and must have previously won a varsity letter. Applicants also show involvement in other school and community activities; submit two letters of recommendation and a 500-word essay on the importance of sportsmanship in educational athletics.

Recipients of the 2021-22 Scholar-Athlete Award receive a \$2,000 college scholarship to be used at the college, university, or trade school of their choice during the 2022-23 school year. This year, a total of 1,434 applications from 407 schools were received for the 32 scholarships. Class A students were guaranteed 12 winners, Class B eight winners, Class C six winners and Class D four winners. Two at-large winners were also selected.

All scholarship recipients will be honored during the MHSAA Boys Basketball Finals at the Breslin Center in East Lansing this March.

Student Advisory Council Aids MHSAA

Eight student-athletes who are juniors at their schools during the 2021-22 academic year have been selected to serve two-year terms on the Michigan High School Athletic Association's Student Advisory Council.

The Student Advisory Council is a 16-member group which provides feedback on issues impacting educational athletics from a student's perspective, and also is involved in the operation of Association championship events and other programming. Members of the Student Advisory Council serve for two years, beginning as juniors. Eight new members are selected annually to serve on the SAC, with nominations made by MHSAA member schools. The incoming juniors will join the group of eight seniors-to-be appointed a year ago.

Selected to begin serving on the Student Advisory Council in 2021-22 are: **Sam Gibson**, Plainwell; **Brady Leistra**, East Grand Rapids; **Caroline Li**, Okemos; **Sam Matias**, Lansing Catholic; **Zar'ria Mitchell**, Saginaw Heritage; **Carney Salo**, Escanaba; **Brandon Thompson**, Petersburg Summerfield; and **Keira Tolmie**, Clarkston.

Those eight new members were selected from 114 applicants. That applicant total was 40 percent more than the total number of applicants who generally apply for SAC positions every year.

Applications for the next SAC class can be found on MHSAA.com are now being accepted through April 25.

The first Student Advisory Council was formed for the 2006-07 school year. With the addition of this class beginning this summer, members will have represented 122 schools from 46 leagues plus independent schools that do not play in a league. Combined, the new appointees have participated in 12 MHSAA sports, and five will be the first SAC members from their respective schools.

The Student Advisory Council generally meets seven times each school year, and once more for a 24-hour leadership camp. Last school year, due to COVID-19, the Council met nearly twice as many times, but virtually all but once when members met for an outdoor, socially-distanced session.

In addition to assisting in the promotion of the educational value of interscholastic

The MHSAA Representative Council

The Representative Council of the Michigan High School Athletic Association is the body assembled to carry out the wishes of member schools. The Council meets several times annually to discuss and pass legislation concerning interscholastic athletics in Michigan.

The Representative Council is made up of 19 members, with all but five elected by a vote of MHSAA-member schools to represent different geographic regions, different sizes of schools, nonpublic schools, and junior and middle schools. Two members are elected to statewide at-large positions. Four members are appointed by the Council to facilitate representation of females and minorities, and the 19th position is occupied by the Superintendent of Public Instruction or his/her designee.

The officers and two other representatives form the MHSAA's Executive Committee, which meets on a monthly basis during the school year to review eligibility appeals and other current business.

Hyman is 2022 WISL Award Winner

Lori Hyman was a sports standout in high school, then at Michigan State University. She then coached college basketball for 17 years, starting when she was only 23 years old, and surely could've continued down that path.

While always a leader, she decided to change gears in 1995 and provide guidance another way – coaching up coaches as a high school athletic director. Over the next 27 years, she became one of the most respected ADs in Michigan

– and contributed in that role at her alma mater Livonia Stevenson over the last 22.

To celebrate her many contributions to school sports, at home but also statewide, Hyman has been named the 35th recipient of the MHSAA Women In Sports Leadership Award. She will receive the award during the Division 1 Girls Basketball Final this weekend.

Hyman served her first five years as an athletic director at Dexter, making the move there after four college basketball coaching stops. After a memorable hoops career at MSU, she served as a women's basketball graduate assistant at Ferris State University and then head coach at Northwood Institute (now University) from 1981-82 – at only 23 years old – through 1985-86.

She then served as an assistant at University of Illinois before returning as head coach at Ferris State from 1989-90 through 1994-95. In Fall 1995, she began at Dexter.

“Every part of my career I've been happy with, and honored, and just thoroughly enjoyed it,” Hyman said. “It's been a passion of mine, every aspect.”

“(Playing at Michigan State) was one of the best times, if not the best time, of my life as a youngster. And then being an athletic director has probably been the most rewarding as an adult. And being at Stevenson, coming back home, has been quite an honor and just a very rich experience for me.”

Each year, the Representative Council considers the achievements of women coaches, officials and athletic administrators affiliated with the MHSAA who show exemplary leadership capabilities and positive contributions to athletics.

Lori HymanHyman is a 1975 graduate of Stevenson, where she also played softball and competed in track & field. She was named MSU's Outstanding Athlete of the Year for women's basketball in 1979, after serving as co-captain of the team that season but missing the majority of it with an injury.

As an athlete at MSU, she joined her teammates in filing a 1978 discrimination complaint that requested the women's basketball team receive travel allowances equal to those received by the Spartans men's team. “It is very meaningful that Michigan State is where they are now, not just in women's basketball but the women's sport program,” Hyman said. “I feel like we were part of that growing and moving forward in a positive way, and I thank Michigan State for recognizing that and moving it forward.”

She graduated with a bachelor's degree in physical education and health in 1980 and has a master's in athletic administration from Wayne State University. She received her certified master athletic administrator designation from the National Interscholastic Athletic Administrators Association (NIAAA) in 2006.

Back at Stevenson, Hyman has directed the athletic program for a high school with nearly 1,700 students, which by enrollment ranks 50th out of 750 MHSAA member schools.

She has hosted a multitude of MHSAA Tournament events while at both Dexter and Stevenson and has served on the MHSAA's girls tennis, girls basketball and boys basketball committees. She also has served as the girls and boys tennis commissioner of the Kensington Lakes Activities Association, of which Stevenson is a member.

“Lori has been a leader and pioneer in the world of athletics, and in particular as an advocate for females and girls sports,” MHSAA Executive Director Mark Uyl said. “When she left coaching basketball to work as an AD, it was an incredible victory for kids in our state. She's been dependable, loyal and just a model of consistency in running a first-class program.”

Hyman was named her region's Athletic Director of the Year by the Michigan Interscholastic Athletic Administrators Association (MIAAA) in 2014 and received its Jack Johnson Distinguished Service Award in 2015.

As an instructor for the MIAAA, Hyman has provided training particularly to beginning athletic directors. She has served as a Leadership Training Institute



instructor as well for the MIAAA and as a presider and speaker at the MIAAA's annual conference. She also has spoken at the MHSAA's Women In Sports Leadership Conference.

“I've always been an advocate for women in sports and equal opportunity,” Hyman added. “I treat all of the sports here equally, male and female. But if I feel that there needs to be a little bit more advocacy for women in sports, whether it's coaching and getting more girls involved, or officiating, administration, any kind of leadership, I'm really big on that.”

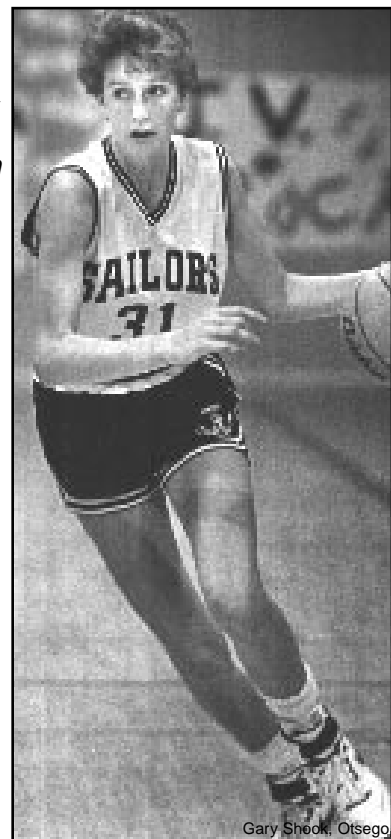

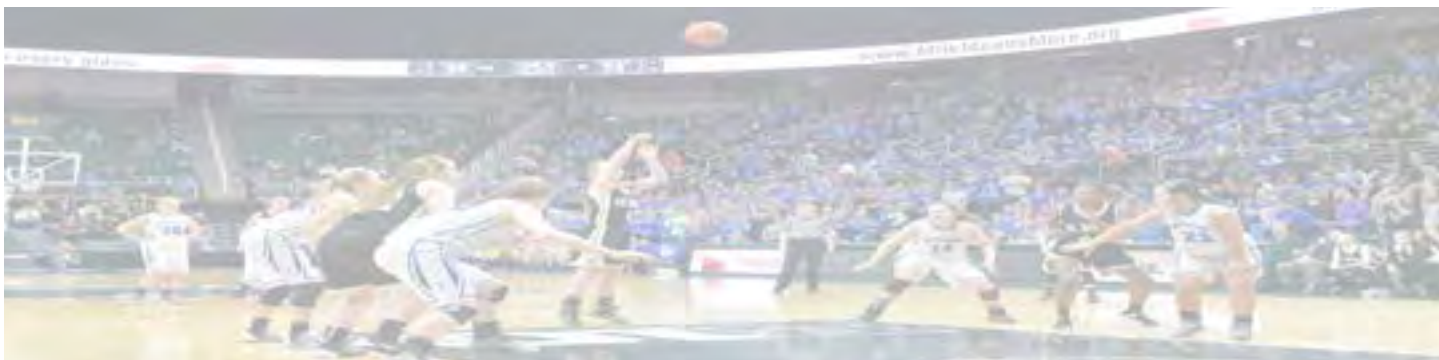

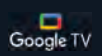
