Hornets Win D2 Overtime Thriller



Before the 2022 Division 2 Final, the Williamston boys basketball team had not been challenged much during the MHSAA Tournament, winning every game by double digits. But the unbeaten Hornets received all they could handle against reigning champion Grand Rapids Catholic Central.

Willamston withstood a furious rally by the Cougars and poor free throw shooting to pull out a dramatic 68-65 over-time win at Breslin Center in East Lansing.

It was the first Finals title for Williamston boys basketball since 1940, as the Hornets finished unbeaten at 27-0.

"These guys did something that people will remember forever," said Williamston coach Tom Lewis, who brought out a team photo of the 1940 champions before the game.

"And they took some heavy punches and most teams would have a hard time pulling that game out, but my guys had just enough counterpunch to get that done. I really don't have the words to say how proud I am of my entire team."

Torrid shooting in the second quarter, including five 3-pointers, helped stake the Hornets to a 36-28 halftime lead.

Williamston led by as many as 16 (53-37) in the third quarter, but the Cougars stormed back. Catholic Central chipped away at the lead and outscored the Hornets 16-7 in the fourth quarter.

"When they were scoring and making that run and our lead was dwindling, we just kept talking about how we need to stick together," said Williamston senior Mason Docks, who scored a team-high 27 points and knocked down six 3-pointers.

Despite missing all five free throw attempts down the stretch in the fourth quarter and going a 9 of 21 from the line for the game, the Hornets still had confidence in overtime.

"We had to have trust in our team," said Hornets 6-foot-10 senior Max Burton, who had 23 points before fouling out. We had to trust that our guards would make the right plays, and we would just go out there and finish it."

Docks made a crucial 3-pointer in overtime to give the Hornets the lead for good. Senior Jacob Wallace added 10 points, eight rebounds and three assists for Williamston.

The Cougars erased the 16-point deficit in part thanks to the stellar play of junior guard Kaden Brown, who had a game-high 33 points, including 25 during the second half and overtime.


He forced extra time with a 3-pointer from the corner with 44 seconds left in regulation that tied the score at 59.

"We've had a few games like that this year where we've been down big, but a lot of credit goes to our players in the huddle for staying calm at halftime and then just regrouping," Catholic Central coach TJ Meerman said. "We kept battling, but tonight was an absolute battle of wills."

The Cougars (25-2) lost for only the second time in the season. Their only other defeat was to Division 3 semifinalist Flint Beecher.

Catholic Central senior Jack Karasinski had 16 points, but picked up his fourth foul in the third quarter and fouled out late in regulation. Sophomore Durral Brooks had nine points and nine rebounds.

DIVISION 1

Warren DeLaSalle 67, Grand Blanc 58

Triston Nichols had quite the high school sports season in 2021-22. The Warren De La Salle junior standout helped the football team win a Finals championship in the fall and then helped deliver the same result on the hardwood four months later.

The Pilots pulled away in the fourth quarter to defeat 2021 champion Grand Blanc 67-58 in the Division 1 title game at the Breslin Center.

It was De La Salle's first basketball title. The Pilots finished Class B runners-up in 1982.

"I actually brought (my football championship ring) with me, and I think it's my good luck charm," said Nichols, who had 17 points, including two timely 3-pointers in the second half


Pilots' junior Nino Smith, who led a balanced scoring attack with 18 points, said the rigors of their league helped prepare them for this historic run.

"Earlier in the season we went to double overtime against (Orchard Lake) St. Mary's and showed a lot of resiliency even though we came up short," Smith said. "A lot of games in the Catholic League came down to last possessions, so I think that really helped us."

De La Salle (19-7) held a slim 42-40 lead entering the final quarter, but never relinquished it thanks to several clutch plays and made free throws.

Junior guard RJ Taylor kept the Bearcats (21-5) within striking distance and finished with a game-high 28 points and seven 3-pointers.

DIVISION 3

Schoolcraft 59, Menominee 49

In 2021, the Schoolcraft boys basketball team came close to reaching its ultimate goal. A year later, the Eagles were motivated to take that next step and complete what they started.

Schoolcraft defeated overall top seed Menominee 59-49 in the 2022 Division 3 Final at Breslin Center.

The Eagles (25-2) won the program's first Finals title since claiming Class C in 2011. Schoolcraft advanced to the Semifinals in 2021 and lost to Iron Mountain in overtime.

"It was really cool for us to get here, but we wanted more this time," said senior Ty Rykse, who helped lead Schoolcraft with 15 points, 10 rebounds and seven assists.

Rykse's younger brother, sophomore Shane Rykse, also contributed sizably with 15 points as the Eagles held off a late run by the Maroons.


Ty Rykse had nine of the team's first 15 points.

The Eagles got off to a hot start and shot a torrid 72 percent (8-of-11) from the field in the first quarter en route to a double-digit advantage, 20-10. They would bump that lead to 31-20 at half.

Eli DeVisser also finished in double figures with 14 points, while senior Tyler DeGroote had a game-high 12 rebounds and seven points.

The Eagles outrebounded the Maroons 40-25 and shot 47 percent for the game, including 50 percent (6-of-12) from behind the 3-point line.

DIVISION 4 Wyoming Tri-unity Christian 56, Ewen-Trout Creek 45

The Wyoming Tri-unity Christian boys basketball team fell short in 2021 in its bid to add another state championship to its storied history.

Senior point guard Brady Titus wasn't about to let history repeat itself.

Titus scored a game-high 33 points to propel the Defenders to a thrilling 56-45 overtime win over Ewen-Trout Creek in the 2022 Division 4 Final.

"There was so much motivation, just coming up short last year," Titus said. "Just knowing that we lost really carried on into this year, and there's a great sense of relief knowing that we really did this as a team."

The Defenders (20-6) gained redemption by outscoring the Panthers 13-2 in overtime.

Tri-unity captured its fifth Final, but first since 2011 under longtime coach Mark Keeler, who watched his team struggle in the second quarter after a strong start.

A 3-pointer from E-TC's Eric Abramson at the buzzer gave the Panthers a 30-23 lead at the half.

Titus scored 23 of his points in the second half and overtime after being held to 10 points in the first half.

His driving lay-up with 33 seconds left knotted the score at 43-43 and sent the game to overtime after the Defenders got a defensive stop in the closing seconds.

Tri-unity turned to its defense in overtime to help secure the win.



The Scholar-Athlete Award

The Michigan High School Athletic Association believes that the athletic field of competition is an extension of the classroom, and that students who choose to participate in sports should use their entire high school educational experience to better themselves in mind, body and spirit.

The MHSAA, in cooperation with Farm Bureau Insurance, presents the 34th annual Scholar-Athlete Award to recognize 32 top male and female student-athletes in sports in which the Association sponsors postseason tournament competition.

Recipients of the 2022-23 Scholar-Athlete Award receive a \$2,000 college scholarship to be used at the college, university, or trade school of their choice during the 2023-24 school year. This year, a total of 1,440 applications from 421 schools were received for the 32 scholarships. Class A students were guaranteed 12 winners, Class B eight winners, Class C six winners and Class D four winners. Two at-large winners were also selected.

All scholarship recipients will be honored in ceremonies at halftime of the Division 3 Boys Basketball Final at the Breslin Student Events Center in East Lansing on March 25.

Applicants for the Scholar-Athlete Award must meet the following criteria: A minimum cumulative grade-point average of 3.5 on a 4.0 scale; and must have previously won a varsity letter. Applicants also show involvement in other school and community activities; submit two letters of recommendation and a 500-word essay on the importance of sportsmanship in educational athletics.

The applications were reviewed by a committee of 70 educators from across the state.

Student Advisory Council Aids MHSAA

ight student-athletes who are now juniors at their schools have begun their two-year terms on the Michigan High School Athletic Association's Student Advisory Council.

The Student Advisory Council is a 16-member group which provides feedback on issues impacting educational athletics from a student's perspective, and also is involved in the operation of Association championship events and other programming. Members of the Student Advisory Council serve for two years, beginning as juniors. Eight new members are selected annually to serve on the SAC, with nominations made by MHSAA member schools. The incoming juniors will join the group of eight seniors-to-be appointed a year ago.

Those eight new members were selected from 115 applicants. That applicant total was the second-most ever, with the last three years featuring the three highest totals.

The first Student Advisory Council was formed for the 2006-07 school year. With the addition of this class beginning this summer, members will have represented 129 schools from 48 leagues plus independent schools that do not play in a league. Combined, the new appointees have participated in nine MHSAA sports, and seven will be the first SAC members from their respective schools.

The Student Advisory Council generally meets seven times each school year, and once more for a 24-hour leadership camp. In addition to assisting in the promotion of the educational value of interscholastic athletics, the Council discusses issues dealing with the 4 S's of educational athletics: scholarship, sportsmanship, safety (including health and nutrition) and the sensible scope of athletic programs. There also is a fifth S discussed by the group – student leadership.



The MHSAA Representative Council

The Representative Council of the Michigan High School Athletic Association is the body assembled to carry out the wishes of member schools. The Council meets several times annually to discuss and pass legislation concerning interscholastic athletics in Michigan.

The Representative Council is made up of 19 members, with all but five elected by a vote of MHSAA-member schools to represent different geographic regions, different sizes of schools, nonpublic schools, and junior and middle schools. Two members are elected to statewide at-large positions. Four members are appointed by the Council to facilitate representation of females and minorities, and the 19th position is occupied by the Superintendent of Public Instruction or his/her designee.

The officers and two other representatives form the MHSAA's Executive Committee, which meets on a monthly basis during the school year to review eligibility appeals and other current business.

Karen Leinaar Earns 2023 Forsythe Award

ew people in Michigan have had a longer-lasting influence on the rules and policies of educational athletics than Frankfort's **Karen Leinaar**, who has served in several roles locally, statewide and nationally over more than 40 years contributing to the school sports community.

Thank you, Bill Baker.

The longtime teacher, coach, principal and superintendent during a career that stretched across multiple schools – including Leinaar's growing up, Delton Kellogg – made an impression on the standout multi-sport athlete before she graduated from high school in 1977. Baker's philosophy and work led Leinaar to study education at Michigan State University and then brought her back as Delton's athletic director to begin four decades of making the same impact on children in her hometown and eventually in hometowns all over Michigan and beyond.

Baker died in 2009, but not before continuing to mentor Leinaar through many good times and tough ones.

"The man had two daughters who I grew up with, his wife was a teacher, and he demonstrated to all of us – he never missed an event – that we were important to him. That even though we weren't his kids, we were his kids and athletics was a way to help kids become better people – and for some kids it was the only thing that they had positive in their life," Leinaar said. "And he made it known just to that individual kid how important their participation was and their involvement, and how that helped them become the person that they were.

"That to me was such an example of how to help people be good people, that I just took that role on."

It's a role in which she continues to serve. Leinaar began her career as an athletic administrator in 1982, and as the interim athletic director currently at Frankfort High School is serving her fifth district in that position. Since June 2019, she also has served as executive director of the Michigan Interscholastic Athletic Administrators Association (MIAAA), the professional organization for school sports administrators in the state with a membership of nearly 700.

To recognize that longtime and continuing impact, Leinaar has been named the 2023 honoree for the Michigan High School Athletic Association's Charles E. Forsythe Award.

The annual award is in its 46th year and named after former MHSAA Executive Director Charles E. Forsythe, the Association's first full-time and longest-serving chief executive. Forsythe Award recipients are selected each year by the MHSAA Representative Council, based on an individual's outstanding contributions to the interscholastic athletics community.

Leinaar also served 22 years on the MHSAA's Representative Council and a four-year term from 2009-13 on the Board of Directors for the National Federation of State High School Associations (NFHS), and just last week was named to the 2023 class of the National Interscholastic Athletic Administrators Association (NIAAA) Hall of Fame.

"It is impossible even to estimate the number of students, coaches, administrators and others who have been affected by the work Karen Leinaar has done to make school sports the best they can be – not only in her communities, but across Michigan and throughout the country," MHSAA Executive Director Mark Uyl said. "There are few who have equaled her dedication and her support and promotion of the ideals of school-based sports. She has always placed an emphasis on being in the room, on the field or at the arena, actively participating in her leadership roles, and our programs are better for it"

Leinaar first served as athletic director at Delton Kellogg for nearly 17 years, from March 1982 through October 1998. She spent three years at Gaylord, then 8½ at Benzie Central before taking over at Bear Lake in November 2010 and spending the next decade organizing athletic programs for students in grades 5-12 before retiring in January 2021. She came out of retirement to return to the athletic director's chair this past fall as interim AD at Frankfort. She has completed nearly four years as MIAAA executive director, moving into that position after previously serving nine years as an assistant to the executive.

Leinaar began her service on the Representative Council in Fall 1999 and completed her last term as a statewide at-large representative at the Fall 2021 meeting.

She has been honored several times for her contributions. She received the MHSAA's Women In Sports Leadership Award in 1998, a Citation from the NFHS in 2000, and she was named MIAAA Athletic Director of the Year in 2001. She received an MHSAA's Allen W. Bush Award in 2014 – recognition given for work done generally behind the scenes and with little attention.

"This is the top of the mountain, per se. This one does mean so much," Leinaar said of the Forsythe Award. "The names that are associated with this over the years, I never thought I'd be put in that group."

Leinaar remains a continuous source of support at a multitude of MHSAA championship events, and during her time on Council was one of the most frequent representatives handing out trophies and medals to champions and runners-up at Finals events. She began while athletic director at Delton Kellogg hosting the MHSAA Volleyball Finals in Class B and Class C and continues to assist with those championships now played at Kellogg Arena in Battle Creek.

She also hosted Competitive Cheer Finals at Delton Kellogg in 1996 and 1997, Ski Finals while at Gaylord, and many more championship events across the Lower Peninsula. She continues to assist at the MHSAA's Lower Peninsula Cross Country and Track & Field Finals.

After attending Delton Kellogg High School, Leinaar earned a bachelor's degree in physical education, health and recreation, with a minor in driver education, from MSU in 1982. She completed a master's in athletic administration from Western Michigan University in 1994.

Leinaar has been a member for 40 years of both the MIAAA and NIAAA, and has served as chairperson of the MIAAA Annual Conference and awards chairperson for both the state and national bodies. She's also served as chairperson of the MIAAA's Exemplary Athletic Program.
