

### Lakers Achieve Preseason Goal

pparently Sydney Hendrix holds a grudge. The West Bloomfield junior held onto the hurt from her team's Regional Semifinal loss to Hartland in 2020; and in 2022, she let it all out on the court.

Hendrix had 12 points and 13 rebounds to lead the Lakers to a 51-42 victory over the Eagles in the Division 1 Girls Basketball Final at the Breslin Center last March.

"We lost to Hartland my freshman year, and I think I was crying for like three days straight," Hendrix said. "I wanted it so bad, but we couldn't pull out the win. I've been wanting my get-back for a minute now. I'm just so glad we got it."

West Bloomfield/Hartland basketballThe title win was the first in program history for the Lakers, who last played in a Final in 1989. This year's team set the goal of winning it all at the first practice, and after losing its opening game against Dexter, won 25 straight to accomplish that.

"I remember November 12, everybody coming together and saying they wanted the state championship," West Bloomfield coach Darrin McAllister said. "So I knew at that time, our coaching staff, we had to do everything in our power to get us to this point. We bought into the 'I believe' mindset. We worked our tails off, and we got here to the Breslin and we did what we had to do."

West Bloomfield never trailed in the game, and held Hartland at arm's length throughout most of it.

Indya Davis led the Lakers (25-1) with 17 points and 11 rebounds, while Summer Davis and Myonna Hooper each scored nine points for the Lakers.

"This game was very personal," said Hooper, who was also on that 2020 team. "We took it upon ourselves to make sure everybody was in the position they needed to be, everybody was playing their role, everybody was executing, everybody was picking each other's heads up when somebody was down. From Day 1, we've been talking about this, and we never let up."

Amanda Roach scored 21 points for Hartland to lead all scorers. Emerson Sargeant had six points and nine rebounds for the Eagles (25-2).

Roach had half of Hartland's field-goal makes in the game, as the Eagles struggled to make shots, finishing 16 of 64 from the field.

West Bloomfield/Hartland basketball"I think West Bloomfield had a lot to do with that, but on the other hand, we did have some good looks,"



Hartland coach Don Palmer said. "Shots that we normally make, they didn't go today. Sometimes, that just kind of feeds."

West Bloomfield led by as many as 14 points in the second half. Roach tried to pull the Eagles back into the game, and nearly did in the fourth quarter. She hit a long 3-pointer to bring her team to within seven with four minutes to play and put some belief in the Hartland fans.

The Eagles wouldn't get any closer, though, until she hit another long 3 with 25 seconds to play that brought her team within six of the lead. But West Bloomfield was able to close the game out at the free throw line.

"I personally thought we still had a chance with 30 seconds left," Roach said. "We fight back every single game. I'm just proud of everybody."

Each Hartland push was met with a response from the Lakers, and often it was the result of an offensive rebound, or two. Hendrix had seven on her own.

"She's a beast," Palmer said. "She is strong, she can finish, she's got a little bit of a mid-range jumpshot. A lot of times when you have teams with 'superstars' those other kids get lost in the coverage, but I certainly picked (Hendrix) up on tape."

Hartland also came into the contest in search of its first Finals title after advancing beyond the Quarterfinal for the first time.

"Obviously, it feels great to be up here and play with all these girls that I started with," Hartland senior Leah Lappin said. "Obviously, disappointing because we didn't play our best. But it was good to play with these girls."

#### DIVISION 2

#### DEPSA 73, GR West Catholic 55

Detroit Edison girls basketball is back on top. After having their past two seasons ended without a postseason loss, the Pioneers took back their throne in 2022 with a 73-55 Division 2 Final win against Grand Rapids West Catholic.

"Winning a state championship, it means everything to me," Edison senior Ruby Whitehorn said. "All our previous teammates who didn't get the chance to do it, makes this so important."

The title was the fourth for the Edison program, which won three straight from 2017-19 – the first two coming in Class C and the third in Division 2.

The tournament was canceled midway through in 2020, and Edison was forced to pull out of the 2021 tournament, both because of COVID-19.


Given the chance to finish it on the court again, DEPSA took full advantage.

Whitehorn, 2022 Miss Basketball Award winner, led the way, scoring 28 points and grabbing nine rebounds. Madisen Wardell added 17 points and 10 rebounds

The only two seniors on the Edison roster came up biggest at the end of the third quarter and into the fourth, when the Pioneers turned a tight game into a comfortable victory.

When Whitehorn picked up her third foul and got a quick breather, the Pioneers not only held on, but grabbed a lead for good thanks to some free throws and a putback by Wardell.

When Whitehorn came back, she took over with several tough drives to the basket, eventually putting her team up 11 points in the fourth.



#### DIVISION 3

#### **Ypsilanti Arbor Prep 54, Kent City 50**

Kent City never lost hope that it could come back and knock off Ypsilanti Arbor Prep in the 2022 Division 3 Girls Basketball Final.

With less than a minute to play, the Eagles' hope turned into a legitimate chance to do just that, as they had the ball and trailed by just four.

But Kari Woods took it all away.

The Arbor Prep senior guard stole a pass near midcourt and raced for a layup to extend her team's lead to six points with 30 seconds to play, ending Kent City's last, best chance, and sealing what ended up a 54-50 win for the Gators.

"I knew the game was tight, and we had been practicing up the line, all day, every day, every practice," Woods said. "I knew I was there. I saw it and went for it."

It was the second title for Arbor Prep, which also won in 2016 before finishing as runner-up each of the next two years.

Arbor Prep was led by a small but vital senior class that included Woods, Texas A&M-bound Mya Petticord and forward Jazmin Chupp.

Petticord led the Gators (25-2) with 27 points. She had 20 points at halftime after connecting on seven of her first nine shots, and each of her first three 3-point attempts.

Woods added nine points and four steals, including the big one at the end. She played airtight defense all game against dangerous Kent City guard Lexie Bowers, who finished with nine points and nine rebounds. Bowers came into the Final averaging 17 points per game.

Arbor Prep's tight defense frustrated Kent City (26-1) throughout the game, and the team that averages 26 3-point attempts per game could get off only 11 in the Final. The Gators also forced 15 turnovers.



#### **DIVISION 4**

#### Fowler 61, Plymouth Christian 46

Carly Andros could have simply gotten back on defense. The Fowler junior missed the front end of a 1-and-1 with less than two minutes to play in a game her team had essentially already wrapped up.

But Andros did what Fowler had done throughout its 61-46 2022 Division 4 Girls Basketball Final victory against Plymouth Christian Academy – crashed the boards, secured the offensive rebound and turned an empty possession into a layup.

Fowler dominated the glass on its way to a second-straight Finals title, outrebounding Plymouth Christian 42-20, including a 15-2 edge on the offensive boards. Fowler turned that into 14 second-chance points, continually turning Plymouth Christian defensive stops into backbreaking scoring plays.

It was the third title for the Fowler program, which had three Finals appearances during the 1990s, including the Class D win in 1991.

Senior Mia Riley led Fowler with 15 points and 12 rebounds, while her younger sister, Emma, had 14 points. Emma Riley scored her 1,000th career point early in the third quarter.

Grace Epkey added 10 points and 11 rebounds for Fowler. Taylor Weber had nine points on a trio of 3-pointers, and Andros had seven rebounds.

Senior Anna Fernandez scored 23 points to lead Plymouth Christian in her final high school game. Junior Morganne Houk added 17 points.

### Sportsmanship Extends to Online Behavior

ith the changes that have occurred in college sports the past couple of years, high school sports is truly the last level of pure amateur competition in our country – and the NFHS and its member state associations want it to remain that way.

As football, volleyball, soccer, cross country and other sports begin this fall, high school coaches and athletic/activity directors will be involved in preseason meetings to emphasize the expected outcomes of education-based sports, as well as speech, debate, music, theatre and other programs.

Among those fundamental values of education-based activities that must be discussed is sportsmanship, or good sporting behavior. More than winning, more than learning the skills of a sport, a focus on sportsmanship has been one of the defining elements of high school sports and other activities for more than 100 years.

Along with maintaining the sound traditions of sports and minimizing the risk of injury, NFHS playing rules encourage sportsmanship, and the first page in all NFHS rules publications includes a statement noting that "each athlete is responsible for exercising caution and good sportsmanship."

In the past, with an emphasis on conduct on the playing field or court – or in the auditorium or rehearsal hall – sportsmanship has been defined as those qualities of behavior that are characterized by generosity and genuine concern for others. More so than preparing students to play sports or another activity at the next level, one of the significant goals of education-based high school sports and activities is helping the 12 million-plus individuals in these programs to become responsible citizens.

And in today's online world dominated by handheld devices, that goal has become more challenging. Now, messages to students in high school sports and other activities about sportsmanship must be communicated before they hit the practice field or court because one inappropriate post, tweet or message could alter their lives forever.

At the recent virtual National Student Leadership Summit hosted by the NFHS, Christina Jontra of Neptune Navigate, one of the newest NFHS corporate partners, discussed the need for good sportsmanship online as much or more so than on the court or field.

In the digital age in which we live, participants in high school activity programs need to be aware that their character and respect for others should be the same, whether in the sport or activity itself, or online.

As the popularity and influence of social media continues to surge, it is imperative that student-athletes, as well as coaches, administrators, parents and everyone involved in education-based athletics, are aware of the ways they can endanger themselves with their online behavior and understand the techniques they can employ to prevent that from happening.

In her recent presentation, Jontra noted five characteristics of good sportsmanship online – honesty, compassion, respect, responsibility and courage. Just as a student

would respect an opponent on the field or in the debate room, the same must occur online.

At preseason meetings this fall, coaches and athletic/activity directors should encourage students in their programs to be mindful of online contact with individuals on opposing teams – particularly any bantering that could be perceived as cyberbullying. As Jontra mentioned in her message during the NSLS, hurtful words can ruin a person's life forever.

Fortunately, during the season, the millions of high school students involved in sports and performing arts have less free time to spend online on a daily basis, but the time spent must be done in a positive manner. Not only could damaging words on social media affect a student's chances for an athletic scholarship, inappropriate messages could also negatively impact future job possibilities as employers are more actively auditing social media.

Whether the setting is before hundreds of people at an actual game or event, or a private experience alone online, positive and respectful behavior should be the choice every time.

### **Scholar-Athlete Class of 2023**

he Michigan High School Athletic Association/Farm Bureau Insurance Scholar-Athlete Award has been recognizing the top student-athletes for 34 years. Applicants for the Scholar-Athlete Award must meet the following criteria: A minimum cumulative grade-point average of 3.5 on a 4.0 scale; and must have previously won a varsity letter. Applicants also show involvement in other school and community activities; submit two letters of recommendation and a 500-word essay on the importance of sportsmanship in educational athletics.

Recipients of the 2022-23 Scholar-Athlete Award receive a \$2,000 college scholarship to be used at the college, university, or trade school of their choice during the 2023-24 school year. This year, a total of 1,440 applications from 421 schools were received for the 32 scholarships. Class A students were guaranteed 12 winners, Class B eight winners, Class C six winners and Class D four winners. Two at-large winners were also selected.

All scholarship recipients will be honored during the MHSAA Boys Baksetball Finals at the Breslin Center in East Lansing this March.



### **Student Advisory Council Aids MHSAA**

ight student-athletes who are now juniors at their schools have begun their two-year terms on the Michigan High School Athletic Association's Student Advisory Council.

The Student Advisory Council is a 16-member group which provides feedback on issues impacting educational athletics from a student's perspective, and also is involved in the operation of Association championship events and other programming. Members of the Student Advisory Council serve for two years, beginning as juniors. Eight new members are selected annually to serve on the SAC, with nominations made by MHSAA member schools. The incoming juniors will join the group of eight seniors-to-be appointed a year ago.

Selected to begin serving on the Student Advisory Council in 2022-23 were: Kannon Duffing, Manchester; Claire Gorno, Gaylord; M'Khi Guy, Muskegon; Dawsen Lehew, Marcellus; Christian Sanders, Detroit Renaissance; Ben Sytsma, Grand Rapids Christian; Madeline Werner, Bay City All Saints; and DaNia Womack, Dearborn Advanced Tech Academy.

Those eight new members were selected from 115 applicants. That applicant total was the second-most ever, with the last three years featuring the three highest totals.

The first Student Advisory Council was formed for the 2006-07 school year. With the addition of this class beginning this summer, members will have represented 129 schools from 48 leagues plus independent schools that do not play in a league. Combined, the new appointees have participated in nine MHSAA sports, and seven will be the first SAC members from their respective schools.

The Student Advisory Council generally meets seven times each school year, and once more for a 24-hour leadership camp. In addition to assisting in the promotion of the educational value of interscholastic athletics, the Council discusses issues dealing with the 4 S's of educational athletics: scholarship, sportsmanship, safety (including health and nutrition) and the sensible scope of athletic programs. There also is a fifth S discussed by the group – student leadership.

### The MHSAA Representative Council

The Representative Council of the Michigan High School Athletic Association is the body assembled to carry out the wishes of member schools. The Council meets several times annually to discuss and pass legislation concerning interscholastic athletics in Michigan.

The Representative Council is made up of 19 members, with all but five elected by a vote of MHSAA-member schools to represent different geographic regions, different sizes of schools, nonpublic schools, and junior and middle schools. Two members are elected to statewide at-large positions. Four members are appointed by the Council to facilitate representation of females and minorities, and the 19th position is occupied by the Superintendent of Public Instruction or his/her designee.

The officers and two other representatives form the MHSAA's Executive Committee, which meets on a monthly basis during the school year to review eligibility appeals and other current business.

# Glass is 2023 WISL Award Winner

ailing from one of Michigan's smallest communities, Laurie Glass has made an impact that continues to connect all over Michigan.

Her impact on women's athletics began long before a career that has seen the longtime Leland volleyball coach become one of the winningest in state history.

As a high school junior in 1976, she recruited seven classmates and a coach to form Leland's first girls sports team - for basketball - and the same group then played volleyball that winter. She was a senior and major contributor when,

during their second season, the Comets won the 1978 Class D volleyball title.

More than four decades later, Glass is a Michigan legend in that sport – a winner of 1,218 matches with Leland and Traverse City Central and three Finals championships with the Comets. She's also a nationally-recognized voice in volleyball and women's athletics as a whole – and this year's MHSAA Women in Sports Leadership honoree for those many and continuing contributions.

"Because I'm a teacher and coach, that's my desire to help the youth be the best they could be. And if I can impact a coach or impact another district or program, that means I'm affecting more youth in a positive way," Glass said. "So for me, it's just the ripple effect; it gets a lot bigger when I'm starting little drops in other places. So I can affect the hundreds of kids that I've seen go through Leland, or I can impact the larger audience by impacting coaches or impacting kids in other places that can then impact other people. It allows me a wider audience for wanting to help young women to be their best young woman self in however way I can make that happen."

Each year, the Representative Council considers the achievements of women coaches, officials and athletic administrators affiliated with the MHSAA who show exemplary leadership and positive contributions to athletics.

Leland finished 49-13 this past season and reached the Division 4 Quarterfinals. Glass has a record of 1,218-393-122 over more than three decades as a varsity volleyball coach, having led the Comets for a combined 29

seasons over three tenures, the first beginning with the 1989-90 winter season and later picking up with her most recent return for Fall 2010. She also coached Traverse City Central for four seasons beginning in 1991-92.

Glass led Leland to Class D Finals championships in 2002, 2006 and 2015, and runner-up finishes in Class D in 2014 and Division 4 in 2018 and 2019. She named to the Michigan Interscholastic Volleyball Coaches Association (MIVCA) Hall of Fame in 2006, and selected as national Coach of the Year in volleyball in 2014 by the National Federation of State High School Associations (NFHS) Coaches Association. She's a three-time MIVCA Coach of the Year and was named High School Coaches Association (MHSCA) Coach of the Year for volleyball in 2015. She also was a finalist for National High School Athletic Coaches Association (NHSACA) national Coach of the Year in 2014.

Glass has spoken multiple times at the MHSAA Women In Sports Leadership Conference and several times at the MIVCA Coaches Clinic, and among various other engagements was the featured speaker at the Nebraska Athletic Association Coaches Clinic. She will receive the Women In Sports Leadership Award during the MHSAA Division 1 Girls Basketball Final on March 18 at Michigan State University's Breslin Center.

"Laurie Glass is recognized most on the statewide level for leading one of the most successful volleyball programs in state history. But she is known among her peers most for the way she teaches not only volleyball but life skills to her athletes," MHSAA Executive Director Mark Uyl said. "Her leadership creates more leaders, be they the athletes who have the opportunity to play for her or the coaches who learn from her and receive her mentorship."

Glass' roots are in one of the most accomplished athletic families in Michigan high school history.

Her father Larry Glass coached Northwestern University's men's basketball program from 1963-69, and later took over the Leland girls basketball program and led the Comets to a 388-110 record and three straight Class D Finals championships (1980-82) over two tenures from 1977-91 and 2000-05. Laurie's sister Rebecca McKee played basketball at Leland and Michigan State University, and her brother Michael Glass played basketball at Lansing Community College before also becoming a high school and college coach.



Laurie also coached and parented arguably the most accomplished volleyball player – and perhaps top female athlete across all sports – in Michigan high school history. Her daughter Alisha Glass-Childress graduated from Leland in 2006 with national records for career kills, aces and blocks, and the first two still top those respective lists. Alisha, also an all-state basketball player, went on to star in volleyball at Penn State and as the U.S. Olympic team setter in 2016 in helping that team to the bronze medal.

Larry Glass' lessons still ring true as Laurie passes them on to another generation. One of her favorite sayings from her father was "you can't take money out of the bank until you put money in" – in essence, a coach can't expect athletes to accept criticism or a hard ask if that coach first hasn't invested in them.

"I've always said that we compete with teams that are way more athletic, have all the things on paper that should beat us. And the fact that we know how to be a really good team is what allows us to beat people who on paper should be better than us," Laurie Glass said. Laurie Glass has served on the MIVCA Executive Board, including as president, and is a member of the MHSCA and Volleyball American Coaches Association (AVCA). Locally, her program annually hosts the Forever Dig Abby match in honor of former player Abby Gross, who died after a fight against cancer in 2015. Proceeds most years go to benefit another community member battling the disease, and this past season went to a fund for efforts related to ovarian cancer.

Glass has served nearly 35 years in education and retired from her duties as a behavior intervention specialist and special education teacher in the Traverse Bay Area Intermediate School District in 2019. She has returned to the school setting, now in her second year as a behavior intervention specialist at Leland.

Glass earned a bachelor's degree in special education with an endorsement in emotional impairment from Western Michigan University in 1988.


