

Hematites Rock to D4 Title



his gave new definition to soaring to new heights on the wings of an eagle. Through the first 15 minutes of the 2024 MHSAA Division 4 championship game against Kingston, Ishpeming sophomore and leading scorer Jenessa Eagle had just two points.

From that point on, nobody on the floor flew higher.

Eagle scored 25 points over the final two quarters plus a minute of the second, finishing with a game-high 27 points to help lead Ishpeming to its first Finals title with a 73-54 win over a Kingston team that also was playing in its first championship game.

"I was really getting into wanting to win," Eagle said. "I was wanting to do it for my team. I was just going out and doing what I practiced."

Ishpeming became the first girls basketball team from the Upper Peninsula to win a Finals championship since Calumet and St. Ignace did so in 2015.

Despite what the final score said, Ishpeming had to navigate some first-half adversity.

Kingston used a 16-2 run late in the first quarter to take a 22-11 lead going into the second. A critical juncture came with 2:34 remaining in the second quarter, when Ishpeming senior Jenna Maki had to leave the game with her third foul.

Kingston held a 26-21 lead at that point, with Maki having scored 16 of the

Hematites' points. But Ishpeming rallied with Maki on the bench, outscoring Kingston 10-4 the rest of the quarter to take a 31-30 lead into halftime.

Eagle and senior Kaitlyn Van Deuren each sank 3-pointers to start the rally, and then Eagle and senior Payton Manninen both added 2-point baskets for the Hematites.

"We have a very trusted bench," Ishpeming head coach Ryan Reichel said. "Our girls all come in knowing that they have a role where they can compete and do some big things for us. Even when Jenna was out, we knew we had girls who could still put the ball in the basket."

Ishpeming continued that momentum during the third quarter, forcing six turnovers over the first 1:39 of the frame to build a 39-30 lead. Eagle then caught fire from the outside, draining a couple of deep 3-pointers to give Ishpeming a 47-34 lead with 3:35 to go in the period.

Ishpeming ultimately took a 58-46 lead into the fourth quarter, with Eagle scoring 15 of the team's 27 points during the third. The Hematites kept up the pressure from there, going on a 10-0 run to take a 73-50 lead with 3:21 remaining and essentially start the celebration.

Maki, the school's all-time leading scorer, finished a terrific career by adding 24 points to her total and pulling down eight rebounds. She and the rest of Ishpeming's seniors fulfilled an ambition they have had since they started playing together in kindergarten.

The Hematites won just five games four seasons ago, but skyrocketed quickly and are now on top of the state.

"It really does feel great," Maki said. "Just like this experience, it feels surreal right now. It's amazing to see all the fans and all our community who made it down here. It's a great feeling."

Senior Abbey Walker had 14 points and 10 rebounds and sophomore Molly Walker scored 14 points for Kingston, which finished a historic season of its own at 27-2.

"This was a great day for Kingston girls basketball," Kingston head coach Jay Green said. "There was a huge crowd here supporting us, and we played an outstanding team. The girls gave it all they got. I told their coach after the game that they can make the final four in Division 1, 2, 3 or 4. That team is outstanding. Everybody knows that."

DIVISION 1 West Bloomfield 60, Grand Blanc 30

Following an overtime Semifinal win over Rockford in a rematch the 2023 Division 1 championship game, West Bloomfield was wary of a letdown entering the 2024 Final.

"A little bit," West Bloomfield senior Summer Davis said. "But we came here for one goal, and that was to win a state championship. I think everybody got that."

The Lakers left no doubt that there wouldn't be a lapse from the start, holding Grand Blanc to just one point in the first quarter, then cruising to a 60-30 win.

It was the Lakers second championship in three years, finishing 27-1.

"I couldn't be more proud of our players," West Bloomfield head coach Darrin McAllister said. "I'm super proud of our seniors. I kind of watched them grow up. They turned out to be two-time champions today, and I couldn't be more proud."

West Bloomfield wouldn't have been in the title game if not for senior Indya Davis banking in a 3-pointer at the regulation buzzer a day earlier, forcing overtime in the Lakers' eventual 55-47 win over the Rams.


West Bloomfield continued to roll right into the Final, scoring the first 10 points against the Bobcats and ultimately leading 15-1 going into the second quarter.

"We had to have the mentality coming out of 'don't underestimate them," Summer Davis said. "Just play hard."

Summer Davis scored 14 points, senior Kendall Hendrix had 13 and Indya Davis had 11 points and eight rebounds for West Bloomfield.

Senior Chelsea Bishop scored 20 points to lead the Bobcats in their first titlegame appearance.

DIVISION 2 Detroit Edison 41, Ann Arbor Fr Gabriel Richard 33

Detroit Edison wanted the opportunity to gain redemption in its return to Michigan State University's Breslin Center in 2024.

The Pioneers needed stout defense during the fourth quarter of the MHSAA Division 2 Final to accomplish that goal. Edison held Ann Arbor Father Gabriel Richard to only three fourth-quarter points on its way to a 41-33 win.

The Pioneers (23-3) won the program's fifth Finals championship over the last 10 years and handed the Irish their only loss of the season.

"We set a goal, and that was to go back here and win," said Edison coach Monique Brown, whose team lost in a 2023 Regional Final after winning Division 2 in 2022.

Edison led 22-17 at the half and still maintained a slight edge going into the fourth quarter when Myana Cooksey dropped in a short baseline jumper to make it 34-30.

The Irish trimmed Edison's lead to one (34-33) when Cora Williams scored inside and converted the and-one with 4:49 left. But the Pioneers held the Irish scoreless the rest of the game.

"We do so many defensive drills, and we started something the last two weeks where we play defense for a whole minute," Brown said.

Senior Isis Johnson-Musah led the Pioneers with 16 points and five rebounds, while Cooksey finished with nine points and six boards.

FGR (28-1) was seeking a perfect season and the program's first Finals win since 1993 in Class D.

DIVISION 3 Ypsilanti Arbor Prep 33, Niles Brandywine 30

Ypsilanti Arbor Prep experienced one of its worst shooting performances of the season in the 2024 MHSAA Division 3 Final.

But instead of dwelling on missed opportunities, they relied on the one thing they know they do well – play defense.

Arbor Prep held Niles Brandywine to its lowest scoring output of the season in earning a gritty 33-30 win at Michigan State University's Breslin Center.

"We have very good athletes and every single one of these girls is tough," Gators coach Scott Stine said. "And they are committed to playing defense. We don't win this game without defense.

Arbor Prep (25-4) won its second Division 3 Final in the last three seasons despite shooting 25 percent (12-48) from the field, including 11 percent (2 of 19) from 3-point range.

Senior Taylor Wallace struggled to find her shooting touch, but had four steals to go with eight points.

The Utomi twins, seniors Stephanie and Stacy, combined for 16 points and 15 rebounds to lead the Gators. Stephanie Utomi had nine points, five rebounds and a game-high six steals, while her sister grabbed a game-high 10 rebounds and chipped in seven points.

Stine was pleased with this team's ability to value each possession. The Gators registered only seven turnovers.

Brandywine was within two points, 21-19, late in the third quarter after five straight points from junior Adeline Gill.

The Bobcats wouldn't get any closer, though, as a 9-1 run by Arbor Prep and stout defense during the final quarter gave them a cushion late.

Scholar-Athlete Class of 2025

he Michigan High School Athletic Association/Farm Bureau Insurance Scholar-Athlete Award has been recognizing the top student-athletes for 36 years. Applicants for the Scholar-Athlete Award must meet the following criteria: A minimum cumulative grade-point average of 3.5 on a 4.0 scale; and must have previously won a varsity letter. Applicants also show involvement in other school and community activities; submit two letters of recommendation and a 500-word essay on the importance of sportsmanship in educational athletics.

Recipients of the 2024-25 Scholar-Athlete Award receive a \$2,000 college scholarship to be used at the college, university, or trade school of their choice during the 2025-26 school year. This year, a total of 1,513 applications from 431 schools were received for 32 scholarships. Class A students were guaranteed 12 winners, Class B eight winners, Class C six winners and Class D four winners. Two at-large winners were also selected.

All scholarship recipients will be honored during the MHSAA Boys Baksetball Finals at the Breslin Center in East Lansing this March.



Student Advisory Council Aids MHSAA

ight student-athletes who will be juniors at their schools during the 2024-25 academic year have been selected to serve two-year terms on the Michigan High School Athletic Association's Student Advisory Council.

The Student Advisory Council is a 16-member group which provides feedback on issues impacting educational athletics from a student's perspective, and also is involved in the operation of MHSAA championship events and other programming. Members of the Student Advisory Council serve for two years, beginning as juniors. Eight new members are selected annually to serve on the SAC, with nominations made by MHSAA member schools. The incoming juniors will join the group of eight seniors-to-be appointed a year ago.

Selected to serve on the Student Advisory Council in 2024-25 are: Itzel Albarran, Bronson; Harper Barnhart, Brownstown Woodhaven; Diamond Cook, Southfield Christian; Henry Ewles, Pontiac Notre Dame Prep; Cole Haist, Big Rapids; Frannie Keeley, Jenison; Trey LaValley, Romeo; and Ethan Stine, Bridgman.

Those eight new members were selected from 90 applicants. The first Student Advisory Council was formed for the 2006-07 school year. With the addition of this class beginning this summer, members will have represented 142 schools from 51 leagues plus independent schools that do not play in a league. Combined, the new appointees have participated in 10 MHSAA sports, and five will be the first SAC members from their respective schools.

The Student Advisory Council generally meets seven times each school year, and once more for a 24-hour leadership camp. In addition to assisting in the promotion of the educational value of interscholastic athletics, the Council discusses issues dealing with the 4 S's of educational athletics: scholarship, sportsmanship, safety (including health and nutrition) and the sensible scope of athletic programs. There also is a fifth S discussed by the group – student leadership.

This school year, the Council handed out championship trophies at Finals events, led sessions during four Sportsmanship Summits and provided assistance at the

Student Advisory Council Belief Statement

The most important goal for student-athletes is to enjoy high school sports while keeping a high level of respect between all those involved in the games.

MHSAA Representative Council

he Representative Council of the Michigan High School Athletic Association is the body assembled to carry out the wishes of member schools. The Council meets several times annually to discuss and pass legislation concerning interscholastic athletics in Michigan.

The Representative Council is made up of 19 members, with all but five elected by a vote of MHSAA-member schools to represent different geographic regions, different sizes of schools, non-public schools, and junior and middle schools. Two members are elected to statewide at-large positions. Four members are appointed by the Council to facilitate representation of females and minorities, and the 19th position is occupied by the Superintendent of Public Instruction or his/her designee.

The officers and two other representatives form the MHSAA's Executive Committee, which meets on a monthly basis during the school year to review eligibility appeals and other current business.

Thunberg Earns 2025 WISL Honor

hrough several professional roles in education, Jennifer Thunberg always has maintained a strong connection with athletics and provided leadership – locally, within her league and sport community, and currently at the statewide level serving on the Representative Council of the Michigan High School Athletic Association.

To recognize her vast an ongoing contributions, Thunberg has been named the 39th recipient of the MHSAA's Women In Sports Leadership Award.

Each year, the Representative Council considers the achievements of women coaches, officials and athletic administrators affiliated with the MHSAA who show exemplary leadership capabilities and positive contributions to athletics. Thunberg will receive her award during the Division 1 Girls Basketball Final Saturday at the Breslin Student Events Center in East Lansing.

A standout herself as a three-sport athlete at Bay City Central and then volleyball player at Saginaw Valley State University, Thunberg began her coaching career at Central in 1997 and teaching career there in 2001. After coaching the volleyball junior varsity two seasons while still playing collegiately, she led the varsity to a 249-201-43 record over 10 seasons before moving on to Pinconning High School, where she served as athletic director from 2008-

Thunberg returned to Central as an assistant

principal and became the school's athletic director in 2017. She remained in that position until becoming principal at Freeland Middle School two years ago.

"A lot of the women who are on that (WISL Award) list are women who have been mentors of mine – who I have worked very closely with – and to be included in that group of women, I'm humbled and honored," Thunberg said. "Jean LaClair (Bronson, 2015) has been a mentor of mine since I began my coaching career, and I can't say enough about her. (There are many) between the volleyball world and athletic director world, and I'm just honored to be part of it."

During her time as Bay City Central's volleyball coach, Thunberg also served as president of the Michigan Interscholastic Volleyball Coaches Association (MIVCA) from 2005-08, and was instrumental in the creation of the annual Miss Volleyball Award honoring the state's top high school senior

As Pinconning and later Central's athletic director, Thunberg hosted several MHSAA Tournament events and Coaches



Advancement Program sessions. She also has served on MHSAA committees for volleyball rules, site selection, Scholar-Athlete Award selection and Women In Sports Leadership Conference planning.

She was one of only two female athletic directors in the Saginaw Valley League when she took that position at Central, and she served as the league's executive director during the 2022-23 school year. The Michigan Interscholastic Athletic Administrators Association (MIAAA) named her its Region 8 Athletic Director of the Year in 2022.

Thunberg also served on the board for the Michigan Association of Secondary School Principals from 2015-21. She was appointed to the MHSAA's Representative Council at its 2023-24 Fall Meeting and is serving a two-year term.

"At every stage of her educational career, Jennifer Thunberg has taken on a leadership role, and her vision and dedication to students is admired by her athletic and administrative communities across the state," MHSAA Executive Director Mark Uyl said. "She is a strong believer in the power of athletics to help drive a student's all-around education, and we are thankful to have her voice representing school sports."


A 1996 graduate of Bay City Central, Thunberg played basketball, volleyball and softball for the Wolves. At SVSU, she earned a bachelor's degree in secondary education and master's in educational leadership, and she remains among the volleyball program's all-time leaders in single-season aces.

Thunberg earned her certified athletic administrator designation from the National Interscholastic Athletic Administrators Association (NIAAA) in 2010, and her certified master athletic administrator designation in 2014.

In addition to leading a school and serving on the MHSAA's Council, she's also currently serving as president of the Bay County Sports Hall of Fame.

"I was student council president in high school, National Honor Society vice president, and whatever group I got involved in ... I just liked to be involved in those organizations," Thunberg said of taking on leadership roles. "And every single one of those organizations improved and helped me more than I've helped the organization. They've taught me things, helped me get to know more people – helped me become who I am today."



Public or Private University
