Executive Committee Authority and Responsibility – The Executive Committee reviewed its authority under Article VII of the MHSAA Constitution and specifically its responsibility to consider each application for waiver of an eligibility requirement on its individual merits, determining if the regulation serves the purpose for which it was intended in each case or if the regulation works an undue hardship on any student who is the subject of a request for waiver. (These underlying criteria may not be restated for every subject of these minutes.)

The MHSAA is a private, nonprofit corporation, made up of voluntary membership; it is neither a state agency nor a court of law, and is not bound by any particular legal standard of review or burden of proof when applying its Regulations or while administering an internal appeal. The *MHSAA Handbook* may identify which party bears the burden of proof, depending on the particular situation or if a particular Regulation is at issue. The MHSAA staff, its Executive Committee, or its Representative Council, where appropriate, shall determine whether the circumstances in each situation, as presented to the MHSAA, warrant application or waiver of a particular Regulation or Interpretation. To make that determination, the MHSAA considers what a reasonable person given the same information would decide.

The Executive Committee was reminded that it was the responsibility of each member school involved to provide sufficient information about the specific request for the Executive Committee to reach a decision without further investigation. If information is incomplete, contradictory or otherwise unclear or has been received too late to be studied completely, the Executive Committee may deny the request for waiver or delay action. Such requests may be resubmitted to the Executive Committee with additional information at a subsequent meeting or appealed to the full Representative Council.

It is possible that some of the information presented as facts to the Executive Committee by school personnel and others may be inaccurate. However, to avoid constant repetition in this report of phrases such as “it was alleged” or “it was reported,” no attempt was made in the introduction of each waiver request to distinguish between truth, allegation, hearsay, opinion, summary or conclusion. If any information provided to the Executive Committee is inaccurate, any decision of the Executive Committee to grant waiver of a regulation shall be vacated.

The Executive Committee is not authorized to approve waiver based on alleged or actual differences between schools based on “environment,” demographics, curriculum or extracurricular offerings nor to change schools for athletics, discipline, or family finances. A determination of undue hardship is a matter addressed to the discretion of the Executive Committee within the educational philosophy and secondary role of voluntary extracurricular competitive athletics in the academic environment. The Executive Committee will avoid making exceptions that would create precedent that effectively changes a rule without Representative Council action or local board of education adoption, which would exceed Executive Committee authority. The agreement the MHSAA has with member schools obligates the MHSAA to not change rules during the school year.

Students for whom waiver of a particular regulation is approved must be eligible in all other respects under all sections and interpretations of the regulations prior to their participation.

Adoption of these regulations, as well as policies, procedures and schedules of MHSAA tournaments, is a choice schools make locally when they consider their option of MHSAA membership. Consistent with rulings of the Attorney General and Michigan Supreme Court, schools are not bound by the decisions of the Executive Committee, but the association may limit participation in the postseason tournaments it sponsors to those schools which choose to apply rules and penalties as promulgated by the MHSAA and adopted by each member school's board of education. The MHSAA exercises no independent authority over schools or students.

St. Clair Shores-Lake Shore High School (Regulation I, Section 1) – A request was made to waive Interpretation #11 (8th-graders competing with and against 9th – 12th-graders) for a student at Lake Shore High School who is an 8th-grade adaptive wheelchair athlete in track & field at Lake Shore Middle School. The request is to allow the student to compete in high school adaptive track & field meets with Lake Shore against other adaptive and wheelchair athletes. The student-athlete does not have anyone to compete with, as there are no middle school adaptive athletes in any meet that he has been a part of for the last two years, but the approval to compete in the relatively new adaptive category of high school track & field will give him opportunities to compete with and against other similar student-athletes. This request was previously granted for the 2025 spring season for this student.

The Executive Committee approved the request for waiver.

Britton Deerfield High School (Regulation I, Section 1[D]) – A request was made to allow the use of 8th-grade student-athletes in their spring athletic programs. Britton Deerfield High School has 125 9th-12th-grade students for the 2025-26 school year. The request went to the Executive Committee with a rationale about the positive impact of using 8th-graders in the Britton Deerfield athletic programs for the remainder of the 2025-26 school year. League support from the Tri-County Conference was received.

The Executive Committee approved the request for waiver.

Adrian, Tecumseh, Adrian-Madison, Onsted and Britton-Deerfield High Schools (Regulation I, Section 1[F-1]) – The Executive Committee approved a cooperative program in boys volleyball (varsity and JV) between these schools. The combined enrollment of 2,456 students would place the team in Division 1. Adrian will be the primary school. Support from the Southeastern Conference was submitted.

Ann Arbor-Father Gabriel Richard and Whitmore Lake High Schools (Regulation I, Section 1[F-1]) – The Executive Committee approved a cooperative program in boys volleyball (varsity only) between these schools. The combined enrollment of 678 students would place the team in Division 2, making no changes to the divisional assignments. Father Gabriel Richard will be the primary school. Support from the Catholic High School League was submitted.

Essexville-Garber and Bay City-All Saints Catholic High Schools (Regulation I, Section 1[E]) – The Executive Committee approved cooperative programs in boys and girls track & field (varsity only) between these schools. The combined enrollment of 562 students would place the team in Division 2, making no changes to divisional assignments. Garber will be the primary school. Support from the Tri-Vally Conference was submitted.

Lansing-Eastern, Lansing-Everett and Lansing-Sexton High Schools (Regulation I, Section 1[F-1]) – The Executive Committee approved a cooperative program in boys volleyball (varsity and JV) between these schools. The combined enrollment of 2,699 students would place the team in Division 1, removing one team from Division 2. Eastern will be the primary school. Support from the Capital Area Activities Conference was submitted.

Madison Heights-Bishop Foley Catholic and Waterford-Our Lady of the Lakes High Schools (Regulation I, Section 1[E]) – The Executive Committee approved a cooperative program in softball (varsity only) between these schools. The combined enrollment of 359 students would place the team in Division 3, making no changes to divisional assignments. Bishop Foley will be the primary school. Support from the Catholic High School League was submitted.

Muskegon Catholic Central and Fruitport-Calvary Christian High Schools (Regulation I, Section 1[E])

– The Executive Committee approved a cooperative program in baseball (varsity only) between these schools. The combined enrollment of 147 students would place the team in Division 4, making no changes to divisional assignments. Muskegon Catholic Central will be the primary school. Support from the Alliance League was submitted.

Whitmore Lake and Whitmore Lake-Livingston Classical Academy High Schools (Regulation I, Section 1[E]) – The Executive Committee approved a cooperative program in boys golf (varsity only) between these schools. The combined enrollment of 211 students would place the team in Division 4, making no changes to divisional assignments. Whitmore Lake will be the primary school. Support from the Michigan Independent Athletic Conference was submitted.

Southfield Christian, Novi Christian Academy and Bloomfield Hills-Academy of the Sacred Heart High Schools (Regulation I, Section 1[E]) – The Executive Committee approved the addition of Academy of the Sacred heart to an already existing cooperative program in softball (varsity only) between the other two schools. The combined enrollment of 395 students would place the team in Division 3, making no changes to divisional assignments. Southfield Christian will be the primary school. Support from the Michigan Independent Athletic Conference was submitted.

Jenison High School (Regulation I, Section 7) – A request to waive the previous academic credit record was made on behalf of a 10th-grade student who dealt with challenges outside of the school setting that negatively affected his health, attendance, and academic performance. The student passed only three of six classes during the first semester of the 2025-26 because of attendance and anxiety issues. Given these circumstances and a strong plan of school and counselor support, the school requested immediate eligibility in baseball, waiving the 60-day ineligibility period.

The Executive Committee approved the request for waiver.

Bangor High School (Regulation I, Section 9) – A request to waive the transfer regulation was made on behalf of a 10th-grade student who attended Saugatuck High School, where she played volleyball and softball until transferring at the start of the 2025-26 school year. The student transferred to Bangor High School and its online Career Academy program due to health issues and because she was staying closer to Bangor with her grandfather, whom she helps care for while also working at his farm. The school requested immediate eligibility in softball.

The Executive Committee approved the request for waiver.

Beverly Hills-Detroit Country Day High School (Regulation I, Section 9) – A request to waive the transfer regulation was made for a 10th-grade student who transferred to Detroit Country Day High School to start the second semester of the 2025-26 school year on January 26, 2026. The student transferred to Detroit Country Day after attending Detroit Renaissance High School. The student participated in girls basketball at Renaissance for her 9th-grade year and one scrimmage for her 10th-grade year before leaving the team. The student transferred after challenges with the school and seeking therapy. The student desired a new, more positive environment and a fresh start at Detroit Country Day. The school requested immediate eligibility in girls basketball.

The Executive Committee approved the request for waiver.

Clinton Township-Chippewa Valley High School (Regulation I, Section 9) – A request to waive the transfer regulation was made on behalf of a 12th-grade student who transferred to Chippewa Valley High School from Marine City-Cardinal Mooney High School at the start of the 2025-26 school year, where she attended since 9th grade. The student played tennis at Cardinal Mooney. The student struggled to feel connected at Cardinal Mooney, and it impacted her health. The family wanted a fresh start with a stronger sense of belonging for the student. Since attending Chippewa Valley, the student has been actively engaged in school extracurricular activities and has developed new friendships. The school requested immediate eligibility in tennis.

The Executive Committee did not approve the request for waiver.

Detroit-Martin Luther King High School (Regulation I, Section 9) – A request to waive the transfer regulation was submitted for a 10th-grade student who competed in basketball the previous school year at Detroit-Voyageur College Prep High School. The student transferred from Voyageur for a fresh start after being accepted at Martin Luther King High School for the 2025-26 school year. While at Voyager, the student competed in one basketball game. The school requested immediate eligibility in basketball, after sitting out one game, which has already occurred since he has sat out the first half of the season.

The Executive Committee approved the request for waiver.

Detroit-Mumford High School (Regulation I, Section 9) – A request to waive the transfer regulation for a student who transferred from Utah Arts Academy High School in Utah to Detroit-Mumford High School to live with his uncle for the start of the 2025-26 school year. While in Utah, the student lived with his mother. The mother has granted guardianship to the uncle because she is in India, undergoing medical surgery and recovery, and can't care for the student. The student initially played nine games while ineligible at Mumford but has now been sitting since December 28th, when it was disclosed that he did not meet an exception. The school forfeited nine games where he competed, and the coach was suspended. The school requested a waiver due to the extenuating circumstances surrounding the move.

The Executive Committee approved the request for waiver.

Dowagiac Union High School (Regulation I, Section 9) – A request to waive the transfer regulation was made on behalf of a 10th-grade student who transferred from Marcellus High School to Dowagiac Union High School on January 27, 2026. The student was placed with a close family friend in Dowagiac and is considered McKinney-Vento under the federal law and by Dowagiac Union. The former school supports the request for immediate athletic eligibility. The school requested immediate eligibility for basketball and soccer for the student.

The Executive Committee approved the request for waiver.

Farmington High School (Regulation I, Section 9) – A request to waive the transfer regulation was submitted on behalf of an incoming 11th-grade student who transferred from the University of Detroit Jesuit High School to Farmington High School to start the 2025-26 school year. The student competed in subvarsity baseball while at U of D Jesuit. The student experienced academic challenges at U of D Jesuit, leading him to quit the baseball team after playing only two games. The school requested immediate subvarsity eligibility in baseball after the student sits out two games.

The Executive Committee approved the request for waiver after two subvarsity baseball games.

Gibraltar-Carlson High School (Regulation I, Section 9) – A request to waive the transfer regulation was made on behalf of an 10th-grade student who has transferred to Carlson High School to start the 2025-26 school year. The student attended Riverview High School and made a full and complete residential family move from Lincoln Park to the Carlton-Airport High School attendance area to start the 2025-26 school year. The student transferred to Carlson because the new home is closer to Carlson than Airport and for the strong academics. The school requested eligibility in softball for the 2025-26 school year, and if that can't be granted, then subvarsity eligibility.

The Executive Committee did not approve the request for waiver.

Grand Ledge High School (Regulation I, Section 9) – A second request to waive the transfer regulation was made for an 11th-grade student who competed in basketball and girls lacrosse the previous school year at Lansing Catholic High School. The student transferred to Grand Ledge High School for the start of the 2025-26 school year. The student struggled with social and emotional issues while at Lansing Catholic. Letters of support from Lansing Catholic staff, letters from a therapist, and additional documentation clarifying the social, emotional, and environmental issues that arose were included. The school requested eligibility in girls lacrosse.

The Executive Committee approved the request for waiver.

Grand Rapids-Forest Hills Northern High School (Regulation I, Section 9) – A request to waive the transfer regulation and specifically Interpretation #62 (closest public school to the new residence) was made for an incoming 12th-grade student who attended Forest Hills Northern High School before transferring to Culver Military Academy for his 11th-grade and first semester of the 2025-26 school year. The student was a boarding student while at Culver and is now moving back to Forest Hills to live with his mother, who resides in the Forest Hills Eastern attendance area. In addition to previously attending Forest Hills Northern as an 8th through 10th-grader, the student's older sibling also attended and graduated from Forest Hills Northern. The school requested immediate eligibility for boys lacrosse.

The Executive Committee approved the request for waiver.

Grand Rapids-South Christian High School (Regulation I, Section 9) – A request to waive the transfer regulation was made on behalf of an 11th-grade student who competed for the previous school year in football and golf at Byron Center High School. The student transferred from Byron Center at the start of the 2025-26 school year because he was not allowed to attend Byron Center due to an out-of-school incident. The student transferred to South Christian High School, the closest school to his home and in the same community. The student has not played any sports this school year. The former school provided written documentation. The school requested eligibility in golf this spring.

The Executive Committee did not approve the request for waiver.

Grand Rapids-West Michigan Aviation Academy (Regulation I, Section 9) – A request to waive the transfer regulation was made on behalf of an 11th-grade student who transferred to West Michigan Aviation Academy from East Kentwood High School where she attended the first semester of the 2025-26 school year. The student competed as a 9th and 10th-grader in girls track & field at East Kentwood. While the student attended East Kentwood, she desired to attend WMAA, where admission is by random lottery, and she was placed on a waitlist. Late in the summer of 2025, she was notified and admitted to WMAA. She chose to attend East Kentwood for the first semester before changing schools at the semester break. The school requested immediate eligibility in girls track & field, given that WMAA was her original school of choice.

The Executive Committee approved the request for waiver.

Grand Rapids-West Michigan Aviation Academy (Regulation I, Section 9) – A request to waive the transfer regulation was made on behalf of a 10th-grade student who transferred to West Michigan Aviation Academy from Byron Center High School, where she attended the first semester of the 2025-26 school year. The student competed as a 9th-grader for Byron Center in girls soccer. While the student attended Byron Center, the student desired to attend WMAA, where admission is by random lottery. The student was not selected before her 9th-grade year but was waitlisted. Just before school started for the first semester in August of 2025, she was notified and admitted to WMAA. She chose to remain at Byron Center for the first semester. The school requested immediate eligibility in girls soccer for the student, given that WMAA was her original school of choice as a 9th-grader.

The Executive Committee approved the request for waiver.

Holland-West Ottawa High School (Regulation I, Section 9) – A request to waive the transfer regulation was submitted on behalf of an incoming 10th-grade student who transferred from Holland High School to West Ottawa High School for the 2025-26 school year. While at Holland, the student played baseball but was injured, playing only seven games before ending his season. The student desired a new start for his physical well-being. The school requested immediate varsity eligibility in baseball, and if that can't be granted, then eligibility after seven games.

The Executive Committee approved the request for waiver after seven baseball games.

Kentwood-East Kentwood High School (Regulation I, Section 9) – A request to waive the transfer regulation was made for an 11th-grade student who competed in football, basketball, and track & field at Kalamazoo Central High School. The student transferred to East Kentwood High School on Feb.5, 2026. The student and family experienced a challenging home life that required them to find alternative housing to live with the student's aunt and uncle in Kentwood. Documentation of the incidents and issues was provided. The school requested immediate eligibility in track & field and for basketball and football for the 2026-27 school year.

The Executive Committee approved the request for waiver.

Lake City High School (Regulation I, Section 9) – A request to waive the transfer regulation was made for a 12th-grade student who enrolled at Lake City High School. The student transferred from Manton High School for the start of the 2025-26 school year. The student participated in one track meet at Manton during the 2024-25 school year. The student transferred to Lake City after challenges in school and on the track team with classmates and teammates. The family felt the student's safety and health needed to be addressed, and they changed schools. The school requested immediate eligibility in track & field after one meet.

The Executive Committee approved the request for waiver after one track meet.

Morrice High School (Regulation I, Section 9) – A request to waive the transfer regulation was made for a 10th-grade student who competed in softball the previous year at Corunna High School. The student transferred to Morrice High School on January 29, 2026, due to incidents that had occurred consistently throughout her high school career at Corunna. The school, family, and student worked to solve the problems through counseling, both in and out of school, to no avail. The school requested eligibility in softball.

The Executive Committee did not approve the request for waiver.

Northville High School (Regulation I, Section 9) – A request to waive the transfer regulation was made for a 10th-grade student who competed in cross country and track the previous school year at South Lyon East High School. The student transferred to Northville High School to start the 2025-26 school year where the student's parents are both teachers. South Lyon East and Northville are on two separate school calendars, which creates scheduling challenges with the family calendar and school breaks. The family felt that all being on the same calendar was important for the student's well-being. The school requested immediate eligibility in track & field.

The Executive Committee did not approve the request for waiver.

Pinckney High School (Regulation I, Section 9) – A request to waive the transfer regulation was made on behalf of an 11th-grade student who attended Pinckney High School until Sept. 30th of the 2025-26 school year before transferring to Kensington Woods Schools, where she did not play any sports. While at Pinckney, the student competed in girls swimming. The family felt a smaller school environment would help address some challenges but decided that returning to Pinckney would work best. The student desires to compete in swimming again at Pinckney. The school requested eligibility in girls swimming for the fall of 2026-27.

The Executive Committee approved the request for waiver.

Port Huron Northern High School (Regulation I, Section 9) - A request to waive the transfer regulation was made on behalf of a 10th-grade student who transferred from Marysville High School on December 1, 2025. The student lived with his whole family in Marysville and attended there for 9th and the beginning of 10th grade, where he played football. The student and his mother moved to the Port Huron Northern High School attendance area, where his grandfather lives, to care for his grandfather. The mother and son are the only ones who can help in the family, as the father and older brother work late nights. This school requested eligibility in football for the fall of 2026.

The Executive Committee approved the request for waiver.

Quincy High School (Regulation I, Section 9) – A request to waive the transfer regulation was made on behalf of a 12th-grade student who transferred to Quincy High School from Coldwater High School for the start of the 2025-26 school year. This student was at Coldwater since the start of her high school career but transferred to Quincy because the impacts on her health there required a different, smaller school environment. While at Coldwater, she played soccer and experienced issues. The school requested immediate eligibility in girls soccer for the spring of 2026.

The Executive Committee did not approve the request for waiver.

Rochester-Adams High School (Regulation I, Section 9) – A request to waive the transfer rule was made on behalf of a 12th-grade student who transferred from Oakland Christian High School to Adams High School to start the 2025-26 school year. The student attended Oakland Christian as a 9th-11th-grader and competed in cross country and track & field. The student and family determined that a new start for academic rigor was necessary for her home public high school district. The school requested eligibility in track & field for the 2025-26 school year.

The Executive Committee did not approve the request for waiver.

Stephenson High School (Regulation I, Section 9) – A second request to waive the transfer regulation was made on behalf of an incoming 11th-grade student who transferred to Stephenson High School from St. Thomas Aquinas Academy in Marinette, WI, to start the 2025-26 school year. The student attended St. Thomas Aquinas for his entire high school career and played football, basketball, and baseball. The student faced harassment and an unhealthy environment. The mother accepted a new position in Escanaba as a principal, and the student desired a new start with family circumstances. New documentation included information related to the bullying and harassment that occurred for this student and why he needed to leave St. Thomas Aquinas. The school requested immediate eligibility in football, basketball, and baseball.

The Executive Committee approved the request for waiver in baseball. The student is eligible in 2026-27 in football and basketball by rule.

Traverse City-St. Francis High School (Regulation I, Section 9) – A request to waive the transfer regulation was made on behalf of a 10th-grade student who attended Traverse City Central High School until transferring to Traverse City St. Francis High School in January of 2026 to start the second semester. The family determined that a new start in a smaller school environment was necessary after the student's brother was diagnosed with health issues. The student experienced repeated disruptions to her routine and emotional strain as a result and desired a new environment. Supporting documentation from the school and family includes letters from Traverse City Central's athletic director, golf coach, and ski coach, as well as a summary of events from the family's perspective. The school requested immediate eligibility in golf for the 2026 spring season and skiing for the 2026-27 school year.

The Executive Committee approved the request for waiver for golf in 2026, and ski in 2026-27.

Vestaburg High School (Regulation I, Section 9) – A request to waive the transfer regulation was made on behalf of a current 10th-grade student who transferred from Shepherd High School to Vestaburg High School. The student attended Shepherd for his educational career and the start of the 2025-26 school year as a 10th-grader and competed in football. The student had challenges at Shepherd, including bullying that impacted his health and well-being. The family felt these allegations were serious enough to warrant a new start in a smaller district. The former school supported the transfer and provided a written response of support. The school requested immediate eligibility in football.

The Executive Committee approved the request for waiver.

Wyoming-Kelloggsville High School (Regulation I, Section 9) – A request to waive the transfer regulation was made on behalf of a 10th-grade student who started his 9th-grade year at Kelloggsville High School and played basketball and baseball before transferring for the start of the 2025-26 school year to Grand Rapids Adventist Academy. The student has now returned to Kelloggsville for the start of the second semester. While at Grand Rapids Adventist Academy, the student did not participate in athletics. The school requested immediate eligibility in basketball and baseball.

The Executive Committee approved the request for waiver.

Yale High School (Regulation I, Section 9) – A request to waive the transfer regulation was made on behalf of a 10th-grade student who attended Yale High School for his 9th-grade year, where he participated in track & field, before transferring to an online program unassociated with Yale because of family circumstances. The student did not play athletics while an online student. The student has now transferred back to Yale. The student desires to compete in track & field again at Yale in the spring of 2026. The school requested immediate eligibility in boys track & field.

The Executive Committee approved the request for waiver.

Northern Lights League (Regulation II, Section 10) – A request was made on behalf of this league, which must use several alternative traveling methods. Given these circumstances, the schools of this league wish to play multiple competitions in a day; the maximum allowed would be twice the published *Handbook* limits (e.g., two basketball games). The members of this league are Beaver Island, Brimley-Ojibwe Charter, Cooks-Big Bay de Noc, Grand Marais-Burt Township, Hannahville-Nah Tah Wahsh, Kinross-Maplewood Baptist, Mackinac Island, Wetmore-Munising Baptist, and Paradise-Whitefish Township. The Executive Committee has approved this annual request for the past three school years. The new request is for the 2026-27 school year.

The Executive Committee approved the request for waiver.

East Grand Rapids High School (Regulation II, Section 11[H]) – Pursuant to Interpretation #240, specifically the staffing limitations in this regulation, a request to waive the four-player rule is submitted on behalf of the East Grand Rapids High School head coach, who is also employed by Pinnacle Field Hockey. Field hockey is among the newest MHSAA sport offerings, and field hockey coaches are scarce; this allowance would create opportunities to grow the game on the west side of the state, both in club and high school settings. This request is for the 2025-26 school year only and would need to be evaluated for future consideration.

The Executive Committee did not approve the request for waiver as it does not fit the requirements of Interpretation #240.

Grand Rapids Christian High School (Regulation II, Section 11[H]) – Pursuant to Interpretation 240, a request to waive the four-player rule for the 2025-26 school year was made on behalf of two girls tennis coaches who are employed by the MVP Sportsplex. MVP Sportsplex is both coaches' primary income. The business is open to the public, and MVP is not promoted in Grand Rapids Christian High School. MVP serves the greater Grand Rapids area and has many students who attend a variety of Grand Rapids high schools. The Executive Committee previously granted the request for the 2024-25 school year.

The Executive Committee approved the request for waiver.
