


2021 Review

Youth is Served for EGR

The frightening thing about East Grand Rapids' girls lacrosse roster in 2021 was there was just one senior. The Pioneers beat Bloomfield Hills Cranbrook Kingswood 15-11 at Novi High School to claim their seventh MHSAA Division 2 title.

It was an opportunity the 2020 seniors didn't receive due to COVID-19 forcing a canceled season, and that wasn't lost on their former teammates who came back this spring.



"It was really tough last year; we had so many seniors that we loved so much and were excited about playing with," said junior Lucy Cavanaugh, who had six assists and scored four goals for EGR. "This year we wanted to come in strong."

Junior Lizzie Lundeen, who had scored 102 goals heading into this week, added five more in the finale.

"The only goals that were important were the ones scored in this game," she said. "Eliana (LaMange) played great. She had that goal just before half, (that) was amazing. We felt a lot stronger with that goal (which made it 10-6)."

East Grand Rapids (23-2) previously had won six titles while Cranbrook (13-7) had championships in 2017 and 2018.

Cavanaugh scored her third to start the second half as East Grand Rapids opened up an 11-6 lead.

The teams traded goals with LaMange scoring her fourth of the game to make it 12-7. Cavanaugh responded with her fourth to increase the lead to 13-7. EGR started pouring it on as LaMange scored her fifth to make it 14-7.

Division 1 - Rockford 19, Brighton 16


Overcoming a canceled season in 2020, Rockford made it eight straight MHSAA Division 1 titles with a 19-16 victory over Brighton at Novi High School.

Only COVID-19 has interrupted the Rams' near decade-long dominance – although the Bulldogs made a strong attempt as the teams met in the Final for the third-straight season.

"This is just a special group of young ladies," said Rockford coach Mike Emery. "They've been through so much with the off-field stuff, COVID and the protocols. To be able to finish our season this year is just incredible."

Rockford (14-4) also had defeated Brighton (18-6-1) during the regular season 19-5. Rockford got on the board early on a goal by Chloe Dunham, who scored six goals, with an assist from Mackenzie Delacher. Seconds later, **Isabelle Osborn** (below left), who tallied five goals, made it 2-0 Rams.

Osborn made it 3-0 less than one minute later with her sec-



ond goal.

Brighton got going with a goal by Gabby Mainhardt. But Sydney Walsh made it 4-1 Rams, and seconds later Chloe Holmes scored another to make it 5-1.

Osborn scored her third goal of the game to make it 7-3, and Katherine Rodriguez scored seconds later to make it 8-3.

After trailing 11-7 at halftime, Amanda Granader scored her second goal of the game to get Brighton within 11-8 early in the second half, but Rockford answered every Brighton charge.

Pioneers Reclaim Top Spot

East Grand Rapids senior Ted Campbell was the differencemaker for the Pioneers during the MHSAA Division 2 Final, junior Jack Higgins had to be the answer.

Campbell scored three early goals to help East Grand Rapids build a 4-1 lead, and Higgins scored two key goals to help his team fend off comeback attempts by Ada Forest Hills Eastern during the Pioneers' 12-10 victory.

"I think I was just in the right spot at the right time," Higgins said. "The coaches had us going through our offense, and the ball came to me and the opportunity presented itself. I just finished.'

The first of his two goals came in the opening minutes of the second half. Forest Hills Eastern had trimmed the lead to 4-3 thanks to scores by seniors John Morgan and Kevin Sprague. Higgins scored unassisted to build the lead back to two.

Late in the third quarter, with the Hawks again applying pressure after cutting the lead to 8-6 on a goal by senior Nicholas Mesler, it was Higgins who once again stepped up and scored to make it a three-goal game.

The Pioneers weathered a couple more Hawks rallies in the fourth guarter. This time it was Campbell who answered the call. He scored the first two goals of the final period — giving him six for the game. Forest Hills Eastern would not get within two goals after that point.

"I just try to get everyone fired up to play every day and make things as fun as possible," said Campbell, who finished the day with six goals.

The championship was the Pioneers' third since the 2017 season, but the first for Campbell, who was on the junior varsity team the last time his school won a title in 2018.

It really doesn't take all that long for the Warriors to make an opponent pay.


Hartland learned that first-hand during the 2021 MHSAA Division 1 Final. The Warriors erased a two-goal deficit

over the final 21.4 seconds of the first half, then outscored the Eagles, 6-0, in the third quarter en route to a 14-9 victory.

"That was huge," Brother Rice head coach Ajay Chawla said. "We're down two, and they've taken the momentum over. We score two quick ones there at the end. That was a game changer."

Hartland had rallied from an early 2-0 deficit to grab a 5-3 lead with 1:15 left in the first half. Five Eagles scored, capped off with a goal by senior Charlie Anderson, who took a pass from freshman Drew Lockwood and scored to give his team its biggest lead of the game.

Brother Rice wasted little time answering. Sophomore **Ben Eck** (below) scored the first of his two goals to cut the lead to 5-4. After gaining possession of the ensuing faceoff, Chawla called a timeout to set up one last play before halftime.



"We were talking (during the timeout)," said Warriors senior Luke Dudley. "I wasn't really beating my guy to the net in the first half, but I was getting my hands free. I I had (Josh knew Schlackman) off the pick, hit him, bang."

It was the second-consecutive Division 1 championship for the Warriors. who have now won 15 of the 16 MHSAA Division 1 trophies handed out.







Title IX Turns 50, and Results Speak Volumes

To say that American female athletes dominated the recent Olympics in Tokyo would be an understatement. Among the 66 medals earned by American female Olympians – most by any country in the history of the Games – were gold-medal performances by the U.S. basketball, volleyball, water polo and beach volleyball teams. Eighteen medals were earned by the U.S. women swimmers, female track and field athletes claimed 15 medals, and the U.S. women's softball and soccer teams won silver and bronze medals, respectively.

In the past 30 years of the Olympic Games, the United States has dominated the women's team sports of basketball (nine golds), soccer (four golds, one silver, one bronze) and softball (three golds, two silvers) — not to mention the untold number of medals in track and field. And this past summer, the U.S. women's volleyball team claimed its first gold medal.

These performances by some of our nation's most skilled female athletes never would have been possible without the passage of Title IX and the offerings of these sports through our nation's schools. With the chance to play afforded by the landmark Title IX legislation in 1972, girls participation in several high school sports skyrocketed in the years that followed.

When the NFHS conducted its first participation survey in 1971, basketball and outdoor track and field were the primary girls sports, comprising about two-thirds of the 294,000 total. However, with the opportunity to play additional sports, girls flocked to volleyball and softball first, along with cross country and eventually soccer.

Soccer, in fact, has had the most remarkable growth. In 1971, only 700 girls were playing high school soccer. Twenty-five years later, that number had climbed to almost 210,000; and as the 50th anniversary of Title IX approaches, there are now almost 400,000 girls playing high school soccer – a staggering 56,200 percentage increase in 50 years. Soccer now ranks fourth in popularity among girls high school sports – all because of that opportunity in 1972.

There are many other success stories, however. The pre-Title IX survey in 1971 indicated that 1,719 girls were participating in cross country. With increases every year until 2015, today, there are 219,345 girls competing in high school programs and the sport ranks sixth in popularity.

Although participation numbers have leveled a bit the past 10 years, fast-pitch softball is another sport that flourished after the passage of Title IX. With fewer than 10,000 participants in 1971, the numbers quickly rose to 220,000 by 1985 and 343,000 by 2000, and softball is currently fifth among girls sports with 362,038 participants.

Since track and field and basketball were the primary sports in the early days of girls sports programs, increases in those sports have not been as dramatic; however, they remain the first and third most-popular sports, respectively,

today. Volleyball, however, much like soccer, continues its upward climb.

Without a doubt, volleyball has seen the steadiest increases among girls high school sports the past 50 years. After starting with 17,952 participants in 1971, the numbers jumped to 300,810 by 1990 and 409,332 by 2010 and 452,808 by 2018. During its climb, volleyball surpassed basketball as the No. 2 girls sport.

And among the top six girls sports from 2010 to 2018 (numbers are not available the past two years due to the pandemic), volleyball has gained the most participants (43,476), followed by soccer (32,549). And all of this has occurred thanks to legislation passed in 1972 that was not fundamentally meant to address opportunities for girls to participate in high school sports.

The NFHS is leading a yearlong celebration of the 50th anniversary of Title IX, which officially occurs on June 23, 2022. "Title IX at 50 – Celebrating and Growing Opportunities" is highlighting the law's impact by celebrating the inspirational individuals and landmark moments in the history of Title IX, and continuing to grow the educational and competitive opportunities for the future.

Scholar-Athlete Class of 2022

he Michigan High School Athletic Association/Farm Bureau Insurance Scholar-Athlete Award has been recognizing the top student-athletes for 33 years. Applicants for the Scholar-Athlete Award must meet the following criteria: A minimum cumulative grade-point average of 3.5 on a 4.0 scale; and must have previously won a varsity letter. Applicants also show involvement in other school and community activities; submit two letters of recommendation and a 500-word essay on the importance of sportsmanship in educational athletics.

Recipients of the 2021-22 Scholar-Athlete Award receive a \$2,000 college scholarship to be used at the college, university, or trade school of their choice during the 2022-23 school year. This year, a total of 1,434 applications from 407 schools were received for the 32 scholarships. Class A students were guaranteed 12 winners, Class B eight winners, Class C six winners and Class D four winners. Two at-large winners were also selected.

All scholarship recipients will be honored during the MHSAA Boys Baksetball Finals at the Breslin Center in East Lansing this March.



Student Advisory Council Aids MHSAA

ight student-athletes who are juniors at their schools during the 2021-22 academic year have been selected to serve two-year terms on the Michigan High School Athletic Association's Student Advisory Council.

The Student Advisory Council is a 16member group which provides feedback on issues impacting educational athletics from a student's perspective, and also is involved in the operation of Association championship events and other programming. Members of the Student Advisory Council serve for two years, beginning as juniors. Eight new members are selected annually to serve on the SAC, with nominations made by MHSAA member schools. The incoming juniors will join the group of eight seniors-to-be appointed a year ago.

Selected to begin serving on the Student Advisory Council in 2021-22 are: Sam Gibson, Plainwell; Brady Leistra, East Grand Rapids; Caroline Li, Okemos; Sam Matias, Lansing Catholic; Zar'ria Mitchell, Saginaw Heritage; Carney Salo, Escanaba; Brandon Thompson, Petersburg Summerfield; and Keira Tolmie, Clarkston.

Those eight new members were selected from 114 applicants. That applicant total was 40 percent more than the total number of applicants who generally apply for SAC positions every year.

Applications for the next SAC class can be found on MHSAA.com are now being accepted through April 25.

The first Student Advisory Council was formed for the 2006-07 school year. With the addition of this class beginning this summer, members will have represented 122 schools from 46 leagues plus independent schools that do not play in a league. Combined, the new appointees have participated in 12 MHSAA sports, and five will be the first SAC members from their respective schools.

The Student Advisory Council generally meets seven times each school year, and once more for a 24-hour leadership camp. Last school year, due to COVID-19, the Council met nearly twice as many times, but virtually all but once when members met for an outdoor, sociallydistanced session.

In addition to assisting in the promotion of the educational value of interscholastic

The MHSAA Representative Council

The Representative Council of the Michigan High School Athletic Association is the body assembled to carry out the wishes of member schools. The Council meets several times annually to discuss and pass legislation concerning interscholastic athletics in Michigan.

The Representative Council is made up of 19 members, with all but five elected by a vote of MHSAA-member schools to represent different geographic regions, different sizes of schools, nonpublic schools, and junior and middle schools. Two members are elected to statewide at-large positions. Four members are appointed by the Council to facilitate representation of females and minorities, and the 19th position is occupied by the Superintendent of Public Instruction or his/her designee.

The officers and two other representatives form the MHSAA's Executive Committee, which meets on a monthly basis during the school year to review eligibility appeals and other current business.





REMEMBERING THOMAS M. RASHID — 1955-2021

Thomas M. Rashid, who served as associate director for two executives during 18 years with the Michigan High School Athletic Association, died Dec. 3, after a courageous battle with cancer. He was 66.

Tom served as the MHSAA's administrator of boys lacrosse for its entirety as an MHSAA-sponsored sport, beginning in 2005, and was selected for the Michigan High School Lacrosse Coaches Association Hall of Fame in 2018.

He was best-known by the athletic directors who have served the MHSAA's 750 high schools, as Tom often was their first call with questions regarding the MHSAA *Handbook* or eligibility issues. Tom also led the annual UPDATE meetings tour, during which he would provide training and answers on the latest rules changes at stops all over the state. He coordinated and presented orientations each fall for newly-hired athletic directors and also presented sessions to administrative assistants.
