COMEBACK KIDS

Okemos notched its first MHSAA Championship since 2004 on the strength of two late goals to cap unbeaten season.

or three quarters of the 2021 MHSAA Division 1 championship match at Novi High School, undefeated Okemos' offense was lifeless against New Baltimore Anchor Bay.

The Tars paid close attention to Jack Guggemos, and the Chiefs had no answers until suddenly, their preparation for a late-game, must-score scenario played out with a dream result.

Down by a goal, Okemos (20-0-4) scored two within two minutes, 17 seconds of each other during the final 10 minutes to claim its third Finals title in a physical 2-1 victory.

Ben Hussey scored off a great assist from Guggemos to tie the game at 1-1, and Aidan Antcliff scored the game-winner on a free kick from 20 yards out with seven minutes, 42 second to play.

"I just tried to get to the end line, and Ben was there," said Guggemos. "He made a great run to the box and tapped it in. You have to deal with what's thrown at you.

Guggemos had a lot to live up to. His coach and father, Brian, won a Class B title as a senior at Mason in 1989.

"No pressure, right," Jack said, laughing. "It's a great feeling being able to celebrate this with him."

Antcliff knew his shot was in once he booted it.

"It's an unbelievable feeling," said Antcliff, who scored just his second goal of the year. "It was a great shot. I practice that shot in the summertime. I got the opportunity in this game, and I made the most of it. Once I hit it, I knew it was going in."

Anchor Bay/Okemos soccerAnchor Bay (22-2-1) made its first appearance in Final, while Okemos won the 2004 Division 1 title and was the B-C champ in 1984.

Okemos was led by all-state senior Guggemos, who set the school record with 45 goals this fall. Anchor Bay featured three past all-state players in Tanner Hodgson (first team), twin brother Carson Hodgson (second team) and goalie Evan Linsley (second team).

The Tars made sure Guggemos was surrounded any time he had the ball, sometimes with as many as three defenders.

"He was part of our game plan," said Tars coach Nate Williams.

"It was a great game between two great soccer teams. We knew even up 1-0 we couldn't take our foot off the gas."

Neither team generated offense in the first half, with most play at mid-field.

With 2:03 left in the first half, junior midfielder Francesco DiLorenzo blasted a shot past the Okemos keeper to give the upstart Tars a 1-0 lead heading into halftime.



Anchor Bay came out even more aggressive in the second half with the lead and a chance at the state title.

Guggemos was shackled, but he got free to send a pass near the net with 9:59 left that Hussey redirected into the net to tie the game at 1-1.

"It's funny because my assistant coaches were talking about it," said Okemos coach Brian Guggemos. "I've been doing it long enough to know you need to prepare for moments where you're going to be down a goal. In the last three weeks we've practiced being down a goal. We've tried to make sure we were prepared for it. We said look, if we're down a goal here's the formation. We went into it right away, and then I told Ben and Owen (Brewer), our two forwards, get in there and crash the goal. That obviously turns the game around a little bit.

"Aidan hits a banger to win the state championship. We also practice those things everyday this time of the year. The guys have listened to the things we needed to do in practice. They paid attention, and that attention to detail has been pretty good for us."

GR CHRISTIAN SOARS TO TITLE IN D2

Grand Rapids Christian's boys soccer team didn't really start clicking until the 2021 MHSAA Tournament began with Districts.

Once the Eagles got rolling, however, they could not be stopped.

Grand Rapids Christian struck twice early in the Division 2 Final against Bloomfield Hills Brother Rice at Comstock Park High School and made those goals stand in a 2-1 victory.

It was the first MHSAA soccer championship in 20 years for the Eagles (17-7-2), who reeled off seven-straight wins in tourney play after losing four of their last six regular-season games and tying another.

"Really, (we began to believe) once we started the tournament. We started getting on a roll, things started clicking and then after that it just started rolling for us," said Grand Rapids Christian senior Benjamin Kuiper, whose goal with 17:22 left in the first half gave his team a 2-0 lead and proved the winner.

Brother Rice (10-7-4), which was making its first Finals appearance in a dozen years, had lost three of its last four regular-season games and tied in the other entering the District tourney.

The Eagles got on the board with 27:32 left in the first half when senior Hans Pruis beat the Brother Rice keeper to a loose ball and knocked it into the net.

Brother Rice came out in the second half with much more urgency. The Warriors pulled within 2-1 with 13:54 remaining, when senior Romas Mitrius scored on a header off junior Enzo Bordogna's free kick.

That proved the only blemish on the day for Grand Rapids Christian keeper Alexander Scofield, who finished with nine saves.

Grand Rapids Christian surrendered only four goals during the postseason.

Scofield admitted he was a little nervous in the second half, but he and the defense in front of him got the job done.

SAILORS FINALLY GET THEIR 'SHIP IN D3

Grand Rapids South Christian made things happen with its Blength and athleticism, living off set pieces and capturing the 2021 MHSAA Division 3 championship with a 3-1 win over Finals rival Grosse IIe on Saturday at Comstock Park High School.

South Christian seized its first title in six years and the fourth since 2010, featuring three different coaches among those quartet

of championships. It was Coach Joel Vande Kopple's first season with the Sailors after 15 years with Lansing Christian, which he led to the Division 4 title in 2013. His new team solved Grosse Ile after narrow Finals losses to the Red Devils in 2019 and 2020.



It was time to celebrate for South Christian in 2022.

"There was just a focus all year long," said Vande Kopple, whose Sailors finished at 22-0-3. "It was all about getting back here and giving ourselves a chance and we did. I think our seniors who have felt that pain weren't going to let it happen again."

It was the fourth-straight Finals trip for Grosse Ile (21-2-1), which fell to Hudsonville Unity Christian 3-1 in overtime in 2018 before the Red Devils edged SC in 2019 (2-1 in a shootout) and 2020 (1-0).

South Christian scored first on a penalty kick by 6-3 senior Levi DeRuiter 12 minutes into the game. It stayed 1-0 until early in the second half, when senior Logyn Huttenga scored off a set piece to give the Sailors a two-goal lead with 36:24 left in the contest.

Grosse Ile senior Jon Duke gave his team life on his penaltykick tally with 17:14 left to pull within 2-1.

But with the Red Devils in desperation mode during the game's final moments, 6-6 junior Sam Medendorp put it away on a goal with 2:42 left.

South Christian senior keeper Luke VanTol made five saves, while Grosse Ile junior Hayden Watson turned away three shots.

PUMAS POUNCE ON D4 IN 1ST TITLE TRY

Wyoming Potter's House's first trip to the MHSAA Division 4 soccer championship match was a successful one, to say the least.

The Pumas (24-3-1) lived up to their nickname, racing past

Clarkston Everest Collegiate 3-0 to claim their first Finals title in 2021 at Novi High School. It was the first Finals appearance in boys soccer for both schools.

On its way to the championship, Everest (18-3-4), which had nine freshmen on varsity, beat No. 4 Royal Oak Shrine, No. 11 Lansing Christian and No. 10 Bad Axe.

Potter's House had knocked off No. 2 Grandville Calvin Christian, with the Pumas winning three one-goal games and their District final in a shootout on their way to the Final.

The title battle wasn't as close. Potter's House, boasting nine players taller than 6-feet, took the fight to Everest with their quickness for most of the first half as both teams missed a

first half as both teams missed a couple of scoring opportunities.

"These guys have been working passing patterns for the last month-and-half," said Pumas coach Mike Colago. "Guys have been hitting their spots, playing between the lines. We just try to dominate from the beginning and play really fast."

That philosophy worked again.

Forward Jonathan Stout, the team's leading scorer, got the Pumas on the board with a boomer from 25 yards out at the 15:27 mark of the first half. It was his 27th goal of the season.

"There were a bunch of alumni here and guys I played with in the past," said Stout. "This is the first time we've made it this far. For future generations coming here, they can say we can do this because the team before us did it. It builds confidence."

Quickness paved the way for the Pumas' second goal as Yosia Mukanda put the eventual winners up 2-0 with nine minutes left in the first half.

The third tally was knocked in accidentally by an Everest defender with 5:59 left in the half to make it 3-0.



Sportsmanship Extends to Online Behavior

While the changes that have occurred in college sports the past couple of years, high school sports is truly the last level of pure amateur competition in our country – and the NFHS and its member state associations want it to remain that way.

As football, volleyball, soccer, cross country and other sports begin this fall, high school coaches and athletic/activity directors will be involved in preseason meetings to emphasize the expected outcomes of education-based sports, as well as speech, debate, music, theatre and other programs.

Among those fundamental values of educationbased activities that must be discussed is sportsmanship, or good sporting behavior. More than winning, more than learning the skills of a sport, a focus on sportsmanship has been one of the defining elements of high school sports and other activities for more than 100 years.

Along with maintaining the sound traditions of sports and minimizing the risk of injury, NFHS playing rules encourage sportsmanship, and the first page in all NFHS rules publications includes a statement noting that "each athlete is responsible for exercising caution and good sportsmanship."

In the past, with an emphasis on conduct on the playing field or court – or in the auditorium or rehearsal hall – sportsmanship has been defined as those qualities of behavior that are characterized by generosity and genuine concern for others. More so than preparing students to play sports or another activity at the next level, one of the significant goals of education-based high school sports and activities is helping the 12 million-plus individuals in these programs to become responsible citizens.

And in today's online world dominated by handheld devices, that goal has become more challenging. Now, messages to students in high school sports and other activities about sportsmanship must be communicated before they hit the practice field or court because one inappropriate post, tweet or message could alter their lives forever.

At the recent virtual National Student Leadership Summit hosted by the NFHS, Christina Jontra of Neptune Navigate, one of the newest NFHS corporate partners, discussed the need for good sportsmanship online as much or more so than on the court or field.

In the digital age in which we live, participants in high school activity programs need to be aware that

their character and respect for others should be the same, whether in the sport or activity itself, or online.

As the popularity and influence of social media continues to surge, it is imperative that student-athletes, as well as coaches, administrators, parents and everyone involved in education-based athletics, are aware of the ways they can endanger themselves with their online behavior and understand the techniques they can employ to prevent that from happening.

In her recent presentation, Jontra noted five characteristics of good sportsmanship online – honesty, compassion, respect, responsibility and

courage. Just as a student would respect an opponent on the field or in the debate room, the same must occur online.

At preseason meetings this fall, coaches and athletic/activity directors should encourage students in their programs to be mindful of online contact with individuals on opposing teams – particularly any bantering that could be perceived as cyberbullying. As Jontra mentioned in her message during the NSLS, hurtful words can ruin a person's life forever.

Fortunately, during the season, the millions of high school students involved in sports and performing arts have less free time to spend online on a daily basis, but the time spent must be done in a positive manner. Not only could damaging words on social media affect a student's chances for an athletic scholarship, inappropriate messages could also negatively impact future job possibilities as employers are more actively auditing social media.

Whether the setting is before hundreds of people at an actual game or event, or a private experience alone online, positive and respectful behavior should be the choice every time.

Scholar-Athlete Award in 34th Year Awarding Scholarships to Students

Thousands of students voluntarily extend their classroom day by taking part in extracurricular activities, often improving their academic achievements in the process. The value that such programs play in the total education of a high school student is highlighted through the MHSAA/Farm Bureau Insurance Scholar-Athlete Award, which will award \$2,000 scholar-ships to 32 top student-athletes and recognize over 2,000 other outstanding individuals in 2022-23.

Underwritten by Farm Bureau Insurance, the Scholar-Athlete Award is now in its 34th year, and presents scholarships to students in every MHSAA enrollment classification. The scholarships may be used at any institution of higher learning.

"It is amazing to see the number of young people who are proven achievers in academics and activities," said Mark Uyl, executive director of the MHSAA. "At a time when our educational system is coming under fire, the Scholar-Athlete Award is something that proves how important athletics are to the development of a well-rounded person."

Students applying for the Scholar-Athlete Award must be graduating during the 2022-23 school year, carry a 3.5 grade-point average, and have previously won a letter in a varsity sport that the MHSAA sponsors postseason competition.



Applicants will also be required to show involvement in other school- community activities and submit an essay on the importance of sportsmanship in educational athletics.

Application materials can be found on MHSAA.com. Scan the code at right to access the page. Each MHSAA member school is allowed to nominate a number of student-athletes based on the size of the school. Class A schools can nominate six boys and six girls, Class B four boys and four girls, Class C three boys and three girls and Class D two boys and two girls. The first 30 scholarships will be awarded based on this graduated scale, with two additional scholarships intended for minority applicants.

A committee composed of school administrators from across the state will select regional and statewide winners.

Farm Bureau Insurance, a long-time supporter of MHSAA activities, also sponsors other educationally oriented programs.

The 32 scholarship recipients will be recognized at the MHSAA Boys

Basketball Finals at the Breslin Student Events Center in East Lansing in March 2023.

Student Advisory Council Aids MHSAA

ight student-athletes who will be juniors at their schools during the 2022-23 academic year have been selected to serve two-year terms on the Michigan High School Athletic Association's Student Advisory Council.

The Student Advisory Council is a 16member group which provides feedback on issues impacting educational athletics from a student's perspective, and also is involved in the operation of Association championship events and other programming. Members of the Student Advisory Council serve for two years, beginning as juniors. Eight new members are selected annually to serve on the SAC, with nominations made by MHSAA member schools. The incoming juniors will join the group of eight seniors-to-be appointed a year ago.

Selected to begin serving on the Student Advisory Council in 2022-23 are: Kannon Duffing, Manchester; Claire Gorno, Gaylord; M'Khi Guy, Muskegon; Dawsen Lehew, Marcellus; Christian Sanders, Detroit Renaissance; Ben Sytsma, Grand Rapids Christian; Madeline Werner, Bay City All Saints; and DaNia Womack, Dearborn Advanced Tech Academy.

Those eight new members were selected from 115 applicants. That applicant total was the second-most ever, with the last three years featuring the three highest totals.

The first Student Advisory Council was formed for the 2006-07 school year. With the addition of this class beginning this summer, members will have represented 129 schools from 48 leagues plus independent schools that do not play in a league. Combined, the new appointees have participated in nine MHSAA sports, and seven will be the first SAC members from their respective schools.

The Student Advisory Council generally meets seven times each school year, and once more for a 24-hour leadership camp. In addition to assisting in the promotion of the educational value of interscholastic athletics, the Council discusses issues dealing with the 4 S's of educational athletics: scholarship, sportsmanship, safety (including health and nutrition) and the sensible scope of athletic

The MHSAA Representative Council

The Representative Council of the Michigan High School Athletic Association is the body assembled to carry out the wishes of member schools. The Council meets several times annually to discuss and pass legislation concerning interscholastic athletics in Michigan.

The Representative Council is made up of 19 members, with all but five elected by a vote of MHSAA-member schools to represent different geographic regions, different sizes of schools, nonpublic schools, and junior and middle schools. Two members are elected to statewide at-large positions. Four members are appointed by the Council to facilitate representation of females and minorities, and the 19th position is occupied by the Superintendent of Public Instruction or his/her designee.

The officers and two other representatives form the MHSAA's Executive Committee, which meets on a monthly basis during the school year to review eligibility appeals and other current business.
