

MINUTE-MADE

Richland Gull Lake's first-minute goal was all the Blue Devils needed to claim the 2022 MHSAA Division 2 Championship

hirty seconds changed the 2022 MHSAA Division 2 boys soccer championship match between Richland Gull Lake and Bloomfield Hills Cranbrook Kingswood at Novi High School.

It took Gull Lake 30 seconds to score, as junior Ryker Corstange took a slick pass from senior Jasek Zielaskowski and blasted a shot from the left side to give the Blue Devils a 1-0 lead.

That ended up the only goal of the game, as Gull Lake (22-3) claimed its fourth MHSAA Finals title in a defensive struggle.

"Did I think that would stand up? With our defense, I would say yes," said Blue Devils goalkeeper Evan Kaiser, who was brilliant in the victory. "We have a great defense. Everyone does their job. Everyone works hard, and we come together as one big family. Getting a goal early doesn't take the pressure off, but it definitely helps our defense knowing we are up a goal."

Gull Lake didn't allow a goal during its six-game MHSAA Tournament run.

"We got a wake-up call when we lost to Mattawan 4-3 during the regular season," said Ryker Corstange, the nephew of head coach Jeff Corstange. "That sparked us. We were insanely mad. We wanted to go out and show people what Gull Lake was about. We've been known to score pretty fast. Jasek just worked his tail off, got to the corner, crossed it and I was just there to shoot it in."


It was Jeff's fourth Finals title, as he previously won three with the girls soccer team at Gull Lake.

Jeff was more noncommittal about the one goal lasting for the duration of the game.

"We got healthy and got back to what we were supposed to be," said Jeff Corstange. "We got Tre (Reiner) back there. He was out for six weeks, and he's one of our best defenders. Getting him back in the postseason was huge for us. I didn't think that goal would hold up, especially with the wind the way it was. The way they pressed and the way they shoot, with No. 2 (Nathan Hooker). We thought he might be able to take advantage of the wind. With that wind, you have to hit it a little softer. We're not used to that.

"It was a beautiful pass from Jasek, sliding the ball over. We've been doing that all postseason. We practice it all the time, and they made the play. It was a beautiful goal."

Gull Lake entered the postseason as the top-ranked squad in Division 2, with its last title in 2020. The Blue Devils claimed victories over No. 2 Grand Rapids Forest Hills Northern, No. 8 Parma Western and No. 9 DeWitt during their march to the championship game.



Cranbrook (15-2-3) won the Detroit Catholic League AA title and was ranked No. 3 at the end of the regular season. The Cranes pitched four shutouts on their run to the championship under veteran coach Chad O'Kulich.

Playing with the lead, Gull Lake kept the pressure on the Cranes, keeping play in Cranbrook's end. Gull Lake's Zavier Thomas was a constant threat.

Cranbrook found itself a goal down with no offense and no shots on goal in the first half.

"Kaiser is an incredible athlete. He's a great keeper and one of the best I've coached," said Jeff Corstange.

Desperate for a second goal, Adam Boyle hit the crossbar for Gull Lake 11 minutes into the second half.

Cranbrook finally got a shot on goal with 20:58 to play, but the attempt went wide.

The Cranes' best chance to score came from Evan Evans, a senior midfielder. But his shot also hit the crossbar.

"They played hard, and they played aggressive, but they are classy," said O'Kulich. "There was great sportsmanship out there. I think that starts at the high school level."

ADAMS' D1 CROWN IS FIRST SINCE 1999

Rochester Adams goalkeeper John Coon wasn't sure how to feel after his team held off Rockford 2-0 in the 2022 MHSAA Division 1 championship game at Comstock Park HS.

Was it elation at winning a title or relief that the game was over?

"Both," he said after the Highlanders clinched their first Finals championship since 1999. "I'm relieved that it's over and happy we were on the winning side of things."



The Highlanders (17-1-6) handed the Rams (22-1-1) their only loss of the season. It was only the second time this season Rockford allowed two goals in a game.

The Adams goals came toward the end of each half despite Rockford's ability to control play for stretches. The first came with 3:25 to go in the first half. Jackson Craft

The first came with 3:25 to go in the first half. Jackson Craft took a pass from Colton James to notch his team-leading 24th goal of the season.

It was a familiar sight to coach Josh Hickey.

"Jackson has done that all year," Hickey said. "He gets behind you and makes you pay, and he just finishes."

It stayed that way until late in the second half, during which Adams withstood a furious Rockford offensive push that kept the pressure on. A stalwart Highlanders defense and a couple of shots that hit goalposts prevented Rockford from getting on the board.

Adams put it out of reach when Matt Vostriakov scored on an assist from Craft with 4:12 remaining,

"We had a great season," Rockford coach Tim Boleman said. "We had an incredible ride. We accomplished great things. We didn't think we would be here. We were unbeaten until today, the only team in the state to do that."

Instead, on a warm, overcast November afternoon it was the Highlanders' moment in the sun, so to speak.

"They worked so hard to do this, and they wanted this so badly," Hickey said.

CORNERS LEAD HOLLAND CHRISTIAN IN D3

t came down to corner kicks in the 2022 MHSAA Division 3 boys soccer championship game.

Holland Christian converted twice, both during the second half, and took home its first Finals title since 2003 by defeating Grosse lle 2-0 at Comstock Park High School.

Derek Huisman scored near the halfway point of the second half after a scoreless first, and Michael Pierce put the game effec-

tively out of reach on a header with just under 11 minutes to go.

Making it that much sweeter for Huisman, а senior defender. was that the score was his first school high goal.



"It doesn't get any better than that in high school sports," said Maroons coach Dave DeBoer, freshly drenched in ice water after the game.

The Maroons (20-1-3) allowed only two goals over their final 13 games, with 10 shutouts in a row.

After a first half played with howling winds and at times heavy rain, conditions eased up at halftime, while the Maroons made some adjustments.

"I felt we had a few opportunities in the first half, but we were hoping for better execution in the second half," DeBoer said.

At the 24-minute mark of the second half, Holland Christian took what turned out to be a decisive corner kick.

"I was trying to contest the ball," Huisman said. "You always think about putting it away, but you never know what's going to happen on corners, because it's always a little bit wild in there. When the ball hit the ground, I knew I had to put it away, so off the foot and right in the back of the net."

Pierce put the game out of reach with his ninth goal of the season 14 minutes later.

The Warriors, like Greenhills, entered the postseason unranked, but got hot at the end of the year to reach the Final.

Greenhills entered tournament play 3-6-4 before reeling off five straight victories to reach the championship match.

Western Michigan Christian started the season 2-5 and reached its 15th Final by allowing only four goals over six playoff games.

Bradford-Royle said the team changed its defense during the season and took off from that point.

"We usually try to start with a 3-5-2 formation to get a little more offensive power," said Buursma. "The schedule we play doesn't always work that way. We went back to a traditional 4-4-2."

Buursma said he realized the Warriors could accomplish this goal, he joked, "with nine minutes to play."







School Activity Important for Middle Schools

The positive life lessons learned through educationbased athletics and performing arts within our nation's high schools have been documented time and time again: Teamwork . . . Fair Play . . . Self-Discipline . . . Self-Confidence . . . Hard Work.

Studies have also shown that students involved in school-based activity programs have better attendance records and lower dropout rates than students not involved in sports and performing arts. And the necessity of these programs became even more apparent when many schools were forced to implement virtual learning during the pandemic.

The message that has not been shared as frequently is that these same activity programs – sports, music, speech, debate, theater and other activities – are just as crucial to be in place in our nation's junior high schools and middle schools. In addition to the 19,500-plus high schools in the United States, it is estimated that there are another 15,000 middle schools and junior high schools.

Unfortunately, the infrastructure for sports and arts programs at the middle school level is not as organized as it is in grades 9-12. And before kids move from elementary to middle school and opt for non-school sports exclusively in order to play and travel more, efforts should be made by school districts to provide funds and personnel to establish education-based activities in middle schools that are aligned with high school programs.

And the need today is perhaps greater than ever to have these opportunities in place at the middle school level as students leave elementary school and begin the process of becoming teenagers and then adults. Sports and arts programs, along with teacher-coaches who develop and lead these activities, can be stable and positive influences for students at this crucial stage in life.

In the process of developing activity programs in middle schools, alignment with their high school's sports and performing arts programs is important. In the May 2023 issue of *High School Today*, Rhonda Farney, the nation's winningest high school girls basketball coach in the country from Georgetown, Texas, shared a few strategies for aligning a district's middle school and high school programs.

"A successful sports program from middle school through high school requires a cohesive approach that focuses on skill development, teamwork and the creation of a positive culture," Farney said. "The program must be sustainable, requiring the buy-in of multiple people. By creating a program that is integrated, sustainable and successful, students can develop their physical abilities and social skills, and achieve their full potential."

About one-half of the NFHS member state associations offer some level of services for middle school programs, and the NFHS continues to provide more resources for state associations and schools. The NFHS Middle School Committee, chaired by Bill Faflick, executive director of the Kansas State High School Activities Association, was started a couple of years ago and meets annually. In April, the NFHS launched "Middle School Coaching" as an online course on the NFHS Learning Center: NFHSLearn.com.

"Middle School Coaching" is designed as a counterpart to "Fundamentals of Coaching" – the flagship course for high school coaches that was first course ever launched through the Learning Center in 2007. Coaches focused on the true mission of education-based school activities is even more crucial at the middle school level, and this course helps individuals balance the numerous factors in running an efficient middle school activities program.

While much of the messaging the past few years has focused on the need for more officials in middle school and high school sports, that need for human resources extends to coaches as well – coaches who are committed to developing "task-involved" students rather than those who are "ego-involved."

Another tool to help schools initiate middle school activities is the NFHS Middle School Newsletter, which was launched last April and conveys our hope for developing life-changing programs in middle schools nationwide:

"The NFHS believes that an understanding of the unique physical, psychological, emotional and developmental needs of all middle-level age student participants should drive all aspects of middle-level interscholastic activities. We believe middle-level education-based activity programs exist to connect students to the fabric and culture of the school which leads to academic and lifelong success."

The first issue contains tools for dealing with unsportsmanlike behavior, resources for Unified Sports tools at the middle school level, videos to share at parents meetings and resources for Performing Arts at the middle level.

Students in middle schools are entering a challenging time in life and they need positive outlets such as sports and performing arts in an educational setting. We encourage more school districts to allocate the necessary funds to make these programs available.

Scholar-Athlete Award in 35th Year Awarding Scholarships to Students

Thousands of students voluntarily extend their classroom day by taking part in extracurricular activities, often improving their academic achievements in the process. The value that such programs play in the total education of a high school student is highlighted through the MHSAA/Farm Bureau Insurance Scholar-Athlete Award, which will award \$2,000 scholarships to 32 top student-athletes and recognize over 2,000 other outstanding individuals in 2023-24.

Application materials can be found on MHSAA.com. Scan the code below to access the page. Each MHSAA member school is allowed to nominate a number of student-athletes based on the size of the school. Class A schools can nominate six boys and six girls, Class B four boys and four girls, Class C three boys and three girls and Class D two boys and two girls. The first 30 scholarships will be awarded based on this graduated scale, with two additional scholarships intended for minority applicants.

A committee composed of school administrators from across the state will select regional and statewide winners.

Student Advisory Council Aids MHSAA

ight student-athletes who will be juniors at their schools during the ■2023-24 academic year have been selected to serve two-year terms on the Michigan High School Athletic Association's Student Advisory Council.

The Student Advisory Council is a 16member group which provides feedback on issues impacting educational athletics from a student's perspective, and also is involved in the operation of Association championship events and other programming. Members of the Student Advisory Council serve for two years, beginning as juniors. Eight new members are selected annually to serve on the SAC, with nominations made by MHSAA member schools. The incoming juniors will join the group of eight seniors-to-be appointed a year ago.

Those eight new members were selected from 105 applicants. That number of applicants was the fourth-most ever, with the last four years featuring the four highest totals.

The first Student Advisory Council was formed for the 2006-07 school year. With the addition of this class, members will have represented 137 schools from 50 leagues plus independent schools that do not play in a league. Combined, the new appointees have participated in 16 MHSAA sports, and all eight will be the first SAC members from their respective schools.

The Student Advisory Council generally meets seven times each school year, and once more for a 24-hour leadership camp. In addition to assisting in the promotion of the educational value of interscholastic athletics, the Council discusses issues dealing with the 4 S's of educational athletics: scholarship, sportsmanship, safety (including health and nutrition) and the sensible scope of athletic programs. There also is a fifth S discussed by the group – student leadership.

This school year, the Council will hand out championship trophies at Finals events, deliver a message about sports-

The MHSAA Representative Council

The Representative Council of the Michigan High School Athletic Association is the body assembled to carry out the wishes of member schools. The Council meets several times annually to discuss and pass legislation concerning interscholastic athletics in Michigan.

The Representative Council is made up of 19 members, with all but five elected by a vote of MHSAA-member schools to represent different geographic regions, different sizes of schools, nonpublic schools, and junior and middle schools. Two members are elected to statewide at-large positions. Four members are appointed by the Council to facilitate representation of females and minorities, and the 19th position is occupied by the Superintendent of Public Instruction or his/her designee.

The officers and two other representatives form the MHSAA's Executive Committee, which meets on a monthly basis during the school year to review eligibility appeals and other current business.
