

Must-Watch Season



Ella Andree and Clara Saunders started recording a three-part Tik Tok on the opening day of Spring Lake's 2024 girls soccer season, knowing that in order to film Parts 2 and 3 they would need to advance to, and win, the MHSAA Division 2 Final.

Last June, they finished the video.

Spring Lake defeated Bloomfield Hills Marian 1-0 at DeMartin Stadium to avenge a 2021 championship match loss to the Mustangs and claim the first Finals title in school history.

"If we won, we had it ready," Andree said. "We did win, so I hope it looks good.

"The start of our season was a little rough, we had a lot of ties, and we didn't really know where we were going to end up. But we pulled it together and figured out what players needed to do what, and to be here is super crazy."

Andree assisted Aveya Patino on the game's lone goal, and goal-keeper Jessica Stewart made four saves behind a stout Spring Lake defense to give coach Becky May her first title in her eighth season coaching at her alma mater. That it came on the campus where May played collegiately only made it more sweet.

"Extremely proud of my girls, but just proud of West Michigan, our community and how we've been able to step up and really make a name for ourselves in the soccer world," May said. "I played on this field in college, so as a homecoming for me, here's why it's important: When I got announced the first time I started at Michigan State, they announced me from Spring Lake, Michigan, and the girl next to me said, 'Where in the world is Spring Lake?' No one heard of anyone outside the sub(urb)s of Detroit. Well, they've heard of us now. So I'm very proud."

The 2021 championship match appearance was Spring Lake's first, and that ended with a 3-0 defeat at the hands of Marian. Andree, Saunders and Stewart were among the players on the field Saturday who had played in that game as freshmen.

The 2024 match was tightly contested, with both teams having long stretches of possession but not creating many big scoring chances.

The one that hit the back of the net started when Andree won a ball in the corner and played it across the goal. Marian keeper Dani Mertz was able to get a hand on it, but not all of it, and Patino was there to clean it up, scoring the 29th goal of her freshman season. It was also the first goal Marian (15-4-3) had allowed during the post-season.

DIVISION 1: Rochester Adams 2, Hartland 0

Rochester Adams tentatively held onto a one-goal lead in the 2024 MHSAA Division 1 girls soccer championship match at Michigan State University's DeMartin Stadium.

The Highlanders had chance after chance to distance themselves from Hartland, which was being stifled by sophomore goalkeeper Lexi Calcamuggio.

Junior Sadie Rogers had one of those chances, and whiffed on a shot. But she did find the net with 4:39 to play, and Adams went on to claim its third Finals championship with a 2-0 victory.

"My only thought was to help the team out as much as possible," said Rogers, a junior. "I knew this season I was more of an assister. I had the chance, so I took it."

Adams (16-2-2) came into the Final seeking its first Division 1 championship since 1999. The Highlanders also won Class A in 1992, and its two runner-up finishes came during that decade as well.

Both teams missed on early scoring chances until Adams senior Evelyn Kekhoua took a pass from Danielle Danko and scored with 23:46 on the clock to give their team a 1-0 lead.

DIVISION 3: Hudsonville Unity Christian 3, Grosse Ile 0

There were plenty of new faces on the field in 2024 for the Hudsonville Unity Christian girls soccer team, but the result ended up being very familiar.

The Crusaders claimed their second-straight Division 3 Finals title at DeMartin Stadium, and for the second-straight year did so with a 3-0 victory over Grosse Ile.

"We had 12 seniors graduate last year from that state title team, and I think 15 kids total that didn't return," Unity Christian coach Randy Heethuis said.

It was the 12th title for Heethuis and Unity Christian, tying Madison Heights Bishop Foley for most in MHSAA history.

Ava Lutke set up Unity Christian's first goal as she found Emma Vruggink in the box, and Vruggink smashed the ball into the open net 14:27 into the first half.

Unity Christian (22-1-1) consistently put pressure on the Grosse Ile defense, but the score remained 1-0 through the first 10 minutes of the second half.

At that point, however, Unity Christian found some cracks and scored a pair of goals in less than two minutes. First, Lutke jumped on a loose ball near the top of the box and slotted it inside the post.

Tessa Ponstein scored 1:43 later, with a curling left-footed shot from outside the box that found the opposite corner.

DIVISION 4: Jackson Lumen Christi 2, Kalamazoo Christian 1 (SO)

Jackson Lumen Christi keeper Izzy Ermatinger stepped up to kick first as the Titans began a Division 4 championship-deciding shootout Kalamazoo Christian in 2024.

She scored, then was brilliant in net stopping all but one of the Comets' shots to clinch the Titans' first Finals title in this sport with a 2-1 victory at DeMartin Stadium.


Lumen won the shootout 3-1, as Paige Lefere and Paityn Petitto also buried shots in the deciding portion following 100 minutes of regulation and overtime.

The Titans gave up only two goals over seven tournament games during this run. Lumen Christi endured the marathon while subbing only once, making the performance even more impressive.

The Titans struck first when Petitto sent a 40-yard pass to Codi Ruge, who blasted a shot into the net just under four minutes into the match. It was the her 17th goal of the year, and Petitto's 10th assist.

Kalamazoo Christian (18-5-2) wasted no time scoring to start the second half, as Ari Allen capitalized on a Lumen Christi miscue on a pass and scored from the left side to tie the score 1-1.

Both goalies – the Comets' Elizabeth Netz, and Ermatinger – were excellent in goal, making four and seven saves, respectively.



Sportsmanship Extends to Online Behavior

ith the changes that have occurred in college sports the past couple of years, high school sports is truly the last level of pure amateur competition in our country - and the NFHS and its member state associations want it to remain that way.

As football, volleyball, soccer, cross country and other sports begin this fall, high school coaches and athletic/activity directors will be involved in preseason meetings to emphasize the expected outcomes of education-based sports, as well as speech, debate, music, theatre and other programs.

Among those fundamental values of education-based activities that must be discussed is sportsmanship, or good sporting behavior. More than winning, more than learning the skills of a sport, a focus on sportsmanship has been one of the defining elements of high school sports and other activities for more than 100 years.

Along with maintaining the sound traditions of sports and minimizing the risk of injury, NFHS playing rules encourage sportsmanship, and the first page in all NFHS rules publications includes a statement noting that "each athlete is responsible for exercising caution and good sportsmanship."

In the past, with an emphasis on conduct on the playing field or court - or in the auditorium or rehearsal hall - sportsmanship has been defined as those qualities of behavior that are characterized by generosity and genuine concern for others. More so than preparing students to play sports or another activity at the next level, one of the significant goals of education-based high school sports and activities is helping the 12 million-plus individuals in these programs to become responsible citizens.

And in today's online world dominated by hand-held devices, that goal has become more challenging. Now, messages to students in high school sports and other activities about sportsmanship must be communicated before they hit the practice field or court because one inappropriate post, tweet or message could alter their lives forever.

At the recent virtual National Student Leadership Summit hosted by the NFHS, Christina Jontra of Neptune Navigate, one of the newest NFHS corporate partners, discussed the need for good sportsmanship online as much or more so than on the court or field.

In the digital age in which we live, participants in high school activity programs need to be aware that their character and respect for others should be the same, whether in the sport or activity itself, or online.

As the popularity and influence of social media continues to surge, it is imperative that student-athletes, as well as coaches, administrators, parents and everyone involved in educationbased athletics, are aware of the ways they can endanger themselves with their online behavior and understand the techniques they can employ to prevent that from happening.

In her recent presentation, Jontra noted five characteristics of good sportsmanship online honesty, compassion, respect, responsibility and courage. Just as a student would respect an opponent on the field or in the debate room, the same must occur online.

At preseason meetings this fall, coaches and athletic/activity directors should encourage students in their programs to be mindful of online contact with individuals on opposing teams - particularly any bantering that could be perceived as cyberbullying. As Jontra mentioned in her message during the NSLS, hurtful words can ruin a person's life

Fortunately, during the season, the millions of high school students involved in sports and performing arts have less free time to spend online on a daily basis, but the time spent must be done in a positive manner. Not only could damaging words on social media affect a student's chances for an athletic scholarship, inappropriate messages could also negatively impact future job possibilities as employers are more actively auditing social media.

Scholar-Athlete Class of 2025

he Michigan High School Athletic Association/Farm Bureau Insurance Scholar-Athlete Award has been recognizing the top student-athletes for 36 years. Applicants for the Scholar-Athlete Award must meet the following criteria: A minimum cumulative grade-point average of 3.5 on a 4.0 scale; and must have previously won a varsity letter. Applicants also show involvement in other school and community activities; submit two letters of recommendation and a 500-word essay on the importance of sportsmanship in educational athletics.

Recipients of the 2024-25 Scholar-Athlete Award receive a \$2,000 college scholarship to be used at the college, university, or trade school of their choice during the 2025-26 school year. This year, a total of 1,513 applications from 431 schools were received for 32 scholarships. Class A students were guaranteed 12 winners, Class B eight winners, Class C six winners and Class D four winners. Two at-large winners were also selected.

All scholarship recipients were honored during the MHSAA Boys Baksetball Finals at the Breslin Center in East Lansing in March.

Student Advisory Council Aids MHSAA

ight student-athletes who will be juniors at their schools during the 2025-26 academic year have been selected to serve two-year terms on the Michigan High School Athletic Association's Student Advisory Council.

The Student Advisory Council is a 16-member group which provides feedback on issues impacting educational athletics from a student's perspective, and also is involved in the operation of MHSAA championship events and other programming. Members of the Student Advisory Council serve for two years, beginning as juniors. Eight new members are selected annually to serve on the SAC, with nominations made by MHSAA member schools. The incoming juniors will join the group of eight seniors-to-be appointed a year ago.

Selected to begin serving on the Student Advisory Council in 2025-26 are: Nichole James, Detroit Edison; Mia McGregor, Mio; Camryn Siegers, Holland Christian; Lucy Weber, Fenton; Brody Hammer, Middleville Thornapple-Kellogg; Sam Bentley, Ypsilanti Lincoln; Mason Mireles, Hartford; and Joey Smokevitch, Johannesburg-Lewiston.

Those eight new members were selected from 125 applicants, the second largest group of applicants in the 20 years of the council. The first Student Advisory Council was formed for the 2006-07 school year. With the addition of this class beginning this summer, members will have represented 148 schools from 53 leagues plus independent schools that do not play in a league. Combined, the new appointees have participated in 11 MHSAA sports, and six will be the first SAC members from their respective schools.

The Student Advisory Council generally meets eight times each school year, and once more for a 24-hour leadership camp. In addition to assisting in the promotion of the educational value of interscholastic athletics, the Council discusses issues dealing with the 4 S's of educational athletics: scholarship, sportsmanship, safety (including health and nutrition) and the sensible scope of athletic programs. There also is a fifth S discussed by the group – student leadership.

This school year, the Council handed out championship trophies at Finals events, led sessions during four Sportsmanship Summits, provided feedback to the MHSAA Representative Council

MHSAA Representative Council

The Representative Council of the Michigan High School Athletic Association is the body assembled to carry out the wishes of member schools. The Council meets several times annually to discuss and pass legislation concerning interscholastic athletics in Michigan.

The Representative Council is made up of 19 members, with all but five elected by a vote of MHSAA-member schools to represent different geographic regions, different sizes of schools, non-public schools, and junior and middle schools. Two members are elected to statewide at-large positions. Four members are appointed by the Council to facilitate representation of females and minorities, and the 19th position is occupied by the Superintendent of Public Instruction or his/her designee.

The officers and two other representatives form the MHSAA's Executive Committee, which meets on a monthly basis during the school year to review eligibility appeals and other current business.

MICHIGAN ACHIEVEMENT SCHOLARSHIP



Michigan high school seniors and students who recently graduated from high school may be eligible for the Michigan Achievement Scholarship.

Community College Guarantee

All students are eligible for the Community College Guarantee (regardless of family income), which includes:

- Earning a skills certificate or associate degree tuition-free at their indistrict community college!*
- An additional \$1,000 Michigan Achievement Bonus for Pell-eligible students to use toward additional college costs.

Public or Private University

Students may be eligible to receive the Michigan Achievement Scholarship at a Public or Private University.

- Up to \$27,500 to earn a bachelor's degree—that's \$5,500 per year for up to five years.
- 7 in 10 high school graduates are eligible.
- Find out if you are eligible by completing the FAFSA.

Career Training

Students may be eligible to receive the Michigan Achievement Scholarship at a career training program.

- Up to \$4,000 to earn a skill certificate—that's \$2,000 per year for up to two years.
- Find out if your program is eligible by visiting michigan.gov/careertraining.
