Irish Show Heart in Finals Classic

You could forgive Lillie Laney for not immediately processing what she and her Mount Pleasant Sacred Heart volleyball teammates accomplished on the last day of the 2022 season.

In fact, you could forgive anyone who was in Kellogg Arena to watch the Irish comeback in the Division 4 Final for not being quite sure what they just witnessed.

Sacred Heart looked all but done after two sets, but came roaring back to defeat Athens 14-25, 13-25, 25-23, 27-25, 15-11 and claim its first-ever Finals title.

"I can't even remember what the last point was," the Sacred Heart senior said. "It's all just a blur. I just remember us getting the point and everybody dog-piling."

The last point was an Athens attack that went just long, and as soon as the line judge's flag went up, the Sacred Heart bench met Laney and her teammates in the center of the court to start the celebration.

Sacred Heart won the match's final six points, completing a third straight comeback in a must-win set, and finishing off what had seemed improbable about an hour earlier.

"I feel like at the beginning when we were down by a lot, we started getting down on ourselves," Sacred Heart junior libero Bridget Ruiz said. "In the third set, we kind of were like, 'Oh my gosh, we have to pick it up here.'"

The match was the first five-setter of the season for the Irish (44-7-6), who had advanced to the Semifinals a year earlier.

"That's the way a state championship match should be," Irish coach Krista Davis said. "It should be a fight to the end. It should be just a back and forth. I don't think any team really made mistakes. I just felt like it was who could get the ball and just hit it the hardest."

Athens led the majority of the final set, before a Laney block put her team up 12-11. Another block in combination with sophomore setter Sophie Hauck gave the Irish a cushion, and sophomore outside hitter Chelsea Lynch served out the final two points, which ended with Athens attacks going long.

"I always thought it was possible, but that was the final push," Laney said. "That was the, 'We have this now. It's in our hands. It's within reach.'"

Laney finished the match with 19 kills and seven blocks. The 5-foot-10 middle hitter had just two errors on 39 attacks in

the match.

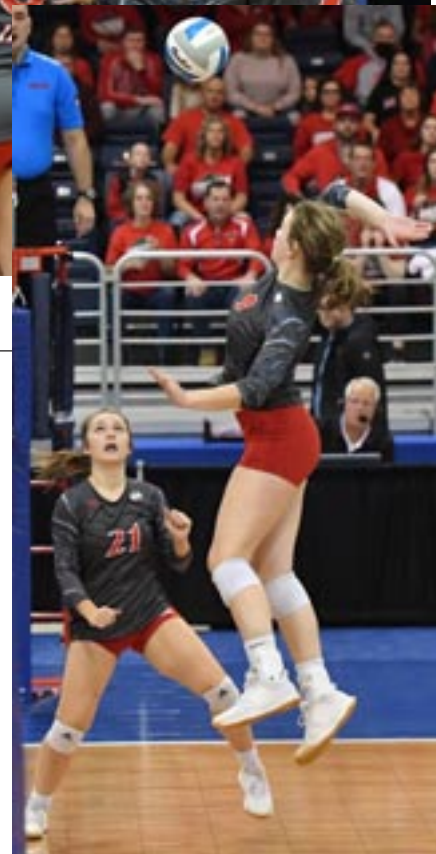
Eliza Pieratt had 17 assists and 17 digs for the Irish, while Hauck had 24 assists and four blocks. Ruiz added 29 digs, Angel Brown had 10 kills and 16 digs, and Lynch had 13 digs.

Most of that came over the final three sets, as Athens was dominant early, and looked well on its way to claiming a first Finals title of its own.

Athens' varied attack with setter Alaina Brubaker feeding hitters Kylie Quist, Kamryn Parlin, Jocelyn Hall and Piper Porter had Sacred Heart reeling through the first two sets.

"I think we started out super strong, and collectively we were playing very, very well," Athens coach Jacy Cole said. "Then, third set, they started getting the momentum and took that third set. We came back in the fourth set and I thought we did well, just made a few communication errors, I think, that kind of rattled us a little bit."

Quist led the Athens attack with 20 kills, while Hall had 18, Porter had 17 and Parlin had 10. Brubaker finished the day with 56 assists and 19 digs. Parlin had a massive game defensively, as well, adding 23 digs and nine total blocks. The other



attackers also chipped in defensively, as Hall had 24 digs, Piper had 18 and Quist had 14.

Athens was playing in a Final for the first time, as it wrapped up a season that featured the program's first Regional title.

"Right now, our team probably doesn't feel like it, but we've done so much this year," Hall said. "It's one of the best feelings ever, and it's something that we're going to remember for a very long time. We're just thankful for everything."

D3: Pewamo-Westphalia Volleyball Joins School Title Tradition

The message in the Pewamo-Westphalia huddle during the 2022 MHSAA Division 3 Final following a dropped third set was to get back to having fun.

The Pirates had been at their best all season while playing loose, and with Kalamazoo Christian pulling to within a set, they didn't want to let the pressure get to them.

Then Kellogg Arena provided an assist.

"Our team has a tradition of the 'Cupid Shuffle,'" senior outside hitter Dani Pohl said. "It's always on our playlist, and we always drop anything to dance to it. So, before the song came on we were just like, 'We need to play loose. We play our best when we have fun.' Then that song came on and we were like, 'OK. This is our song. This is our set. We're going to win this thing in four.'"

Pewamo-Westphalia shuffled its way to a 25-17 win in the fourth set, closing out a 25-17, 25-23, 23-25, 25-17 victory and the program's first Finals title.

Pewamo-Westphalia has had plenty of success as an athletic department. But this trip to the Finals was the volleyball program's first since a runner-up finish in 1994.

"There's been a lot of success over the eight years that I've been

here, and the amount of kids we have coming out to play the sport right now is just humongous," Pewamo-Westphalia coach Jon Thelen said. "This is just a great way to keep the community growing and loving the sport."

Pewamo-Westphalia (46-2-2) was led by Saige Martin with 13 kills, while adding 12 digs and three blocks. Pohl added 10 kills and 15 digs, while Taylor Smith had 36 assists.

Avengers: Marian Takes D1 Title

Izzy Busignani spent most of the 2022 Division 1 Volleyball Final smashing the ball through the court at Kellogg Arena. But when it came time to close out Bloomfield Hills Marian's third straight title, the sophomore went with finesse.

"I saw a triple block in front of me, and I saw that the defense was back on their heels, so I knew that if I tipped it short, it would either be out of system or it would go straight down," Busignani said.

Busignani's 27th kill on the day was a tip over the block that the Northville back line couldn't control, ending a 22-25, 25-22, 25-22, 25-11 victory for Marian.

The win avenged top-ranked Marian's only loss of the season, and gave the program its fifth Finals title.

"The biggest thing we talked about is that this is our home court," Marian coach Mayssa Cook said. "Yes, we were the home team on the scoreboard, but we've been here now, our third year in a row, so this is our home court, and we knew we had that advantage. We had the experience of playing on this stage."

That experience came through in the third set, when Northville (47-4) looked to be in command, taking a 19-12 lead.

But Marian (49-1) rattled off seven straight points – six on the serve of senior Lauren Heming – to put Northville on its heels. Not long after, a pair of kills from Busignani closed out a 25-22 set and gave Marian a 2-1 lead.

From there, Marian would roll, dominating the fourth set on its way to the title.

Busignani's 27 kills led the Marian attack, and she also added 20 digs, tied for the team lead with Heming, who added four aces. Schomer added 14 kills and 17 digs, while Sarafa had 45 assists and 10 digs, and Molly Banta had 14 digs and three aces.

The Marian defense struggled to solve Northville star hitter Abby Reck early in the match, and she still managed to finish with 21 kills. Reck added 19 digs and three aces for Northville, which was making its first Finals appearance.

North Branch Back on Top in D2

Natasha Bickel had an up-close look the last time North Branch won a Finals volleyball title. As a ball girl, she was able to watch the Broncos take home a championship at Kellogg Arena. In 2022, Bickel got to experience being on the court to win one.

"I remember when I was a ball girl one of the years we won states (2016) and one of the years we didn't," Bickel, a senior middle hitter, said. "Coming back here, being in the Finals and winning it? It put the cherry on top."

Bickel and the Broncos defeated Cadillac 31-29, 25-18, 25-17 in the Division 2 Final. It was the fourth title for the program, and first since 2016.

North Branch was the Division 2 runner-up in 2021, losing to Pontiac Notre Dame Prep in the Final. The Broncos downed the Irish in the Regional Final this time around, and didn't drop a set the rest of the way.

But, Cadillac had North Branch (53-7) on the ropes quickly, jumping out to a 16-9 lead in the first set and forcing the Broncos to take a pair of timeouts over a five-point span.

"I just said, keep battling guys, keep battling," North Branch coach Jim Fish said. "That's the mark of a good team that they're not going to give up. We didn't panic, which was good. That's a huge comeback."

When the Broncos did dig out, it led to an epic end of the set. North Branch fought off eight Cadillac set points before finally taking the lead back at 29-28.

Freshman Aubree Deshetsy, who kept the Broncos alive initially with four straight high-pressure serves, had the final three kills of the set to put it away. She had eight kills total in the set.

Deshetsy finished with 13 kills and 14 digs for the Broncos, while Clara Gyomory had 12 kills and Bickel had 11. Alana Deshetsy finished with nine kills and 22 digs, Hailey Green had 25 digs and Adrienne Greschaw had 45 assists for the Broncos.

School Activity Important for Middle Schools

The positive life lessons learned through education-based athletics and performing arts within our nation's high schools have been documented time and time again: Teamwork . . . Fair Play . . . Self-Discipline . . . Self-Confidence . . . Hard Work.

Studies have also shown that students involved in school-based activity programs have better attendance records and lower dropout rates than students not involved in sports and performing arts. And the necessity of these programs became even more apparent when many schools were forced to implement virtual learning during the pandemic.

The message that has not been shared as frequently is that these same activity programs – sports, music, speech, debate, theater and other activities – are just as crucial to be in place in our nation's junior high schools and middle schools. In addition to the 19,500-plus high schools in the United States, it is estimated that there are another 15,000 middle schools and junior high schools.

Unfortunately, the infrastructure for sports and arts programs at the middle school level is not as organized as it is in grades 9-12. And before kids move from elementary to middle school and opt for non-school sports exclusively in order to play and travel more, efforts should be made by school districts to provide funds and personnel to establish education-based activities in middle schools that are aligned with high school programs.

And the need today is perhaps greater than ever to have these opportunities in place at the middle school level as students leave elementary school and begin the process of becoming teenagers and then adults. Sports and arts programs, along with teacher-coaches who develop and lead these activities, can be stable and positive influences for students at this crucial stage in life.

In the process of developing activity programs in middle schools, alignment with their high school's sports and performing arts programs is important. In the May 2023 issue of *High School Today*, Rhonda Farney, the nation's winningest high school girls basketball coach in the country from Georgetown, Texas, shared a few strategies for aligning a district's middle school and high school programs.

"A successful sports program from middle school through high school requires a cohesive approach that focuses on skill development, teamwork and the creation of a positive culture," Farney said. "The program must be sustainable, requiring the buy-in of multiple people. By creating a program that is integrated, sustainable and successful, students can develop their physical abilities and social skills, and achieve their full potential."

About one-half of the NFHS member state associations offer some level of services for middle school programs, and the NFHS continues to provide more resources for state associations and schools.

The NFHS Middle School Committee, chaired by Bill Faflick, executive director of the Kansas State High School Activities Association, was started a couple of years ago and meets annually. In April, the NFHS launched "Middle School Coaching" as an online course on the NFHS Learning Center: [NFHSLearn.com](https://www.nfhslearn.com).

"Middle School Coaching" is designed as a counterpart to "Fundamentals of Coaching" – the flagship course for high school coaches that was first course ever launched through the Learning Center in 2007. Coaches focused on the true mission of education-based school activities is even more crucial at the middle school level, and this course helps individuals balance the numerous factors in running an efficient middle school activities program.

While much of the messaging the past few years has focused on the need for more officials in middle school and high school sports, that need for human resources extends to coaches as well – coaches who are committed to developing "task-involved" students rather than those who are "ego-involved."

Another tool to help schools initiate middle school activities is the NFHS Middle School Newsletter, which was launched last April and conveys our hope for developing life-changing programs in middle schools nationwide:

"The NFHS believes that an understanding of the unique physical, psychological, emotional and developmental needs of all middle-level age student participants should drive all aspects of middle-level interscholastic activities. We believe middle-level education-based activity programs exist to connect students to the fabric and culture of the school which leads to academic and lifelong success."

The first issue contains tools for dealing with unsportsmanlike behavior, resources for Unified Sports tools at the middle school level, videos to share at parents meetings and resources for Performing Arts at the middle level.

Students in middle schools are entering a challenging time in life and they need positive outlets such as sports and performing arts in an educational setting. We encourage more school districts to allocate the necessary funds to make these programs available.

Scholar-Athlete Award in 35th Year Awarding Scholarships to Students

Thousands of students voluntarily extend their classroom day by taking part in extracurricular activities, often improving their academic achievements in the process. The value that such programs play in the total education of a high school student is highlighted through the MHSAA/Farm Bureau Insurance Scholar-Athlete Award, which will award \$2,000 scholarships to 32 top student-athletes and recognize over 2,000 other outstanding individuals in 2023-24.

Underwritten by Farm Bureau Insurance, the Scholar-Athlete Award is now in its 35th year, and presents scholarships to students in every MHSAA enrollment classification. The scholarships may be used at any institution of higher learning.

"It is amazing to see the number of young people who are proven achievers in academics and activities," said Mark Uyl, executive director of the MHSAA. "At a time when our educational system is coming under fire, the Scholar-Athlete

Award is something that proves how important athletics are to the development of a well-rounded person."

Students applying for the Scholar-Athlete Award must be graduating during the 2023-24 school year, carry a 3.5 grade-point average, and have previously won a letter in a varsity sport that the MHSAA sponsors postseason competition.



Applicants will also be required to show involvement in other school/community activities and submit an essay on the importance of sportsmanship in educational athletics.

Each MHSAA member school is allowed to nominate a number of student-athletes based on the size of the school. Class A schools can nominate six boys and six girls, Class B four boys and four girls, Class C three boys and three girls and Class D two boys and two girls. The first 30 scholarships will be awarded based on this graduated scale, with two additional scholarships intended for minority applicants.

A committee composed of school administrators from across the state will select regional and statewide winners.

Farm Bureau Insurance, a long-time supporter of MHSAA activities, also sponsors other educationally oriented programs.

The 32 scholarship recipients will be recognized at the MHSAA Boys Basketball Finals at the Breslin Student Events Center in East Lansing in March 2024.

Student Advisory Council Aids MHSAA

Eight student-athletes who will be juniors at their schools during the 2023-24 academic year have been selected to serve two-year terms on the Michigan High School Athletic Association's Student Advisory Council.

The Student Advisory Council is a 16-member group which provides feedback on issues impacting educational athletics from a student's perspective, and also is involved in the operation of Association championship events and other programming. Members of the Student Advisory Council serve for two years, beginning as juniors. Eight new members are selected annually to serve on the SAC, with nominations made by MHSAA member schools. The incoming juniors will join the group of eight seniors-to-be appointed a year ago.

Selected to begin serving on the Student Advisory Council in 2023-24 are: **Cale Bell**, Sault Ste. Marie; **Drew Cady**, Oxford; **Macy Jenkins**, Milford; **Isaiah Kabban**, Harbor Beach; **Ella Knudsen**, Leland; **Kaylee Kranz**, Clinton; **Joey Spada**, Kalamazoo Central; and **Anna Zoet**, Grandville Calvin Christian.

Those eight new members were selected from 105 applicants. That number of applicants was the fourth-most ever, with the last four years featuring the four highest totals.

The first Student Advisory Council was formed for the 2006-07 school year. With the addition of this class, members will have represented 137 schools from 50 leagues plus independent schools that do not play in a league. Combined, the new appointees have participated in 16 MHSAA sports, and all eight will be the first SAC members from their respective schools.

The Student Advisory Council generally meets seven times each school year, and once more for a 24-hour leadership camp. In addition to assisting in the promotion of the educational value of interscholastic athletics, the Council discusses issues dealing with the 4 S's of educational athletics: scholarship, sportsmanship, safety (including health and nutrition) and the sensible scope of athletic programs. There also is a fifth S discussed by the group – student leadership.

This school year, the Council will hand out championship trophies at Finals events, deliver a message about sports-

The MHSAA Representative Council

The Representative Council of the Michigan High School Athletic Association is the body assembled to carry out the wishes of member schools. The Council meets several times annually to discuss and pass legislation concerning interscholastic athletics in Michigan.

The Representative Council is made up of 19 members, with all but five elected by a vote of MHSAA-member schools to represent different geographic regions, different sizes of schools, nonpublic schools, and junior and middle schools. Two members are elected to statewide at-large positions. Four members are appointed by the Council to facilitate representation of females and minorities, and the 19th position is occupied by the Superintendent of Public Instruction or his/her designee.

The officers and two other representatives form the MHSAA's Executive Committee, which meets on a monthly basis during the school year to review eligibility appeals and other current business.
