Executive Committee Authority and Responsibility – The Executive Committee reviewed its authority under Article VII of the MHSAA Constitution and specifically its responsibility to consider each application for waiver of an eligibility requirement on its individual merits, determining if the regulation serves the purpose for which it was intended in each case or if the regulation works an undue hardship on any student who is the subject of a request for waiver. (These underlying criteria may not be restated for every subject of these minutes.)

The Executive Committee was reminded that it was the responsibility of each member school involved to provide sufficient information about the specific request for the Executive Committee to reach a decision without further investigation. If information is incomplete, contradictory or otherwise unclear or has been received too late to be studied completely, the Executive Committee may deny the request for waiver or delay action. Such requests may be resubmitted to the Executive Committee with additional information at a subsequent meeting or appealed to the full Representative Council.

It is possible that some of the information presented as facts to the Executive Committee by school personnel and others may be inaccurate. However, to avoid constant repetition in this report of phrases such as “it was alleged” or “it was reported,” no attempt is made in the introduction of each waiver request to distinguish between truth, allegation, hearsay, opinion, summary or conclusion. If any information provided to the Executive Committee is inaccurate, any decision of the Executive Committee to grant waiver of a regulation shall be null and void.

The Executive Committee is not authorized to approve waiver based on alleged or actual differences between schools based on “environment,” demographics, curriculum or extracurricular offerings. A determination of undue hardship is a matter addressed to the discretion of the Executive Committee within the educational philosophy and secondary role of voluntary extracurricular competitive athletics in the academic environment. The Executive Committee will avoid making exceptions that would create precedent that effectively changes a rule without Representative Council action or local board of education adoption, which would exceed Executive Committee authority. The contract the MHSAA has with member schools obligates the MHSAA to not change rules during the school year.

Students for whom waiver of a particular regulation is approved must be eligible in all other respects under all sections and interpretations of the regulations prior to their participation.

Adoption of these regulations, as well as policies, procedures and schedules of MHSAA tournaments, is a choice schools make locally when they consider their option of MHSAA membership. Consistent with rulings of the Attorney General and Michigan Supreme Court, schools are not bound by the decisions of the Executive Committee, but the association may limit participation in the postseason tournaments it sponsors to those schools which choose to apply rules and penalties as promulgated by the MHSAA and adopted by each member school’s board of education. The MHSAA exercises no independent authority over schools or students.

Clawson and Rochester Hills-Lutheran Northwest High Schools (Regulation I, Section 1[D]) – The Executive Committee approved a cooperative program in boys tennis (varsity team) between these two schools whose combined 2017-18 enrollment of 918 students will place a new team in the Division 3 tournament. Clawson sponsored boys tennis previously and will be the primary school. Support from the Macomb Area Conference was received.

Madison Heights-Bishop Foley and Bloomfield Hills-Academy of the Sacred Heart High Schools (Regulation I, Section 1[D]) – The Executive Committee waived the April 15 fall sports deadline and approved a cooperative program in girls swimming & diving between these two schools. The combined enrollment of 596 students will continue placement of a team in the Division 3 tournament. Bishop Foley and Sterling Heights-Parkway Christian were previously in a cooperative program, which has dissolved. Bishop Foley will be the primary school. Support from the Catholic High School League was submitted.

Muskegon-Mona Shores, Muskegon—Reeths-Puffer, North Muskegon, Muskegon Catholic Central and Muskegon-Western Michigan Christian High Schools (Regulation I, Section 1[F]) – The Executive Committee approved the addition of Western Michigan Christian to a cooperative program in boys and girls swimming & diving which existed previously with the other four schools and Montague. Montague has withdrawn from the agreement. The combined 2017-18 enrollment of 3,172 students will continue placement of a team in the Division 1 tournaments. Mona Shores will be the primary school. Support from the OK Conference was submitted. A corresponding middle school application was also submitted.

Parma-Western and Hanover-Horton High Schools (Regulation I, Section 1[F]) – The Executive Committee approved a cooperative program in girls gymnastics between these two schools whose combined 2017-18 enrollment of 1,222 students will continue placement of one team in the Gymnastics Tournament. Both schools sponsored the sport previously. Parma-Western will be the primary school. Support from the South Central Gymnastics League was submitted.

Saginaw-Nouvel Catholic Central and Bay City-All Saints Central High Schools (Regulation I, Section 1[D]) – The Executive Committee waived the April 15 fall sports deadline and approved the addition of boys soccer to a cooperative agreement which exists between these two schools in boys tennis. The combined enrollment of 305 students will continue placement of one team in the Division 4 tournament. Nouvel sponsored boys soccer previously and will be the primary school. Support from five future opponents was submitted.

Saginaw and Saginaw Arts and Sciences Academy High Schools (Regulation I, Section 1[D]) – The Executive Committee waived the April 15 fall sports deadline and approved a cooperative program in boys and girls cross country, baseball and girls softball between these two schools. The combined enrollment of 797 students will place one team in the Division 2 cross country, baseball and girls softball tournaments. Both schools sponsored cross-country previously; Saginaw sponsored baseball and softball and will be the primary school for all programs. Support from the Saginaw Valley Conference was submitted.

St. Joseph-Lake Michigan Catholic and Watervliet-Grace Christian High Schools (Regulation I, Section 1[D]) – The Executive Committee waived the April 15 fall sports deadline and approved the addition of boys and girls cross country to a cooperative agreement which exists between these two schools in girls softball. The combined enrollment of 118 students will continue placement of a team in the Division 4 tournament. Lake Michigan Catholic sponsored cross country previously and will be the primary school. Support from 11 member schools was submitted.

Adrian High School (Regulation I, Section 9[D]) – A request to waive the transfer regulation to permit eligibility after 90 scheduled school days of enrollment was made on behalf of a 12<sup>th</sup>-grade student (2017-18) who previously attended Sand Creek and enrolled at Adrian on March 13, 2017.

The Executive Committee approved the request for waiver following the student's 90<sup>th</sup> scheduled school day of enrollment at Adrian High School beginning March 13, 2017.

Auburn Hills-Avondale High School (Regulation I, Section 9) – A request to waive the transfer regulation was made on behalf of an incoming 10<sup>th</sup>-grade student whose mother had legal issues and whose father received custody after the mother attempted to remove siblings from their elementary school. The student is one of seven siblings, attended Avondale Middle School and the 9<sup>th</sup> grade at Avondale High School where he played football. The father home-schooled the student and other siblings in the winter of 2017 as he was preparing to return to his extended family in Texas with the children. The mother then obtained a court order preventing them from relocating. The mother's whereabouts are unknown and a personal protection order was issued preventing her from contact with the children. The student intends to reenroll at Avondale to begin the 2017-18 school year. Avondale anticipates a satisfactory previous semester record for the second semester of 2016-17.

The Executive Committee approved the request for waiver.

Birmingham-The Roeper School (Regulation I, Section 9) – A request to waive the transfer regulation and the elements of a full and complete residential change was made on behalf of an incoming 11<sup>th</sup>-grade student whose parents retired and moved to Florida for the student's 10<sup>th</sup> grade in 2016-17. The student attended Roeper through the 9<sup>th</sup> grade. The school in Florida was not a good fit and the family has rented an apartment near Roeper. The family intends to keep the Florida home for retirement after the student graduates. The student did not play sports in Florida and will be reenrolling at Roeper to begin the 2017-18 school year. Roeper is not the closest nonpublic school to the residence in Michigan, but it is the former school.

The Executive Committee approved the request for waiver.

Dearborn Heights-Annapolis High School (Regulation I, Section 9) – A request to waive the transfer regulation and specifically Interpretation 62 (public school of residence) was made on behalf of an incoming 11<sup>th</sup>-grade student who is moving between divorced parents from his mother in Tennessee to his father's residence in Romulus. The student had attended Annapolis previously in the 9<sup>th</sup> grade while living with his father who took a job in Arizona and has now returned to Michigan. The student moved to Tennessee to live with his mother in the 10<sup>th</sup> grade. An otherwise completed Educational Transfer Form is forthcoming. The request was for eligibility at the former school but not the school of residence.

The Executive Committee approved the request for waiver.

Detroit-Pershing High School (Regulation I, Section 9) – A request to waive the transfer regulation was made on behalf of an incoming 12<sup>th</sup>-grade student who lived with his grandmother and mother and attended Pershing for the 11<sup>th</sup> grade in 2016-17. The mother recently moved to Sterling Heights and the student attended Sterling Heights-Henry Ford II for nine school days from May 2-12, 2017. The student did not participate in athletics at Henry Ford II and reenrolled at Pershing on May 15, 2017. The student attended Beverly Hills-Detroit Country Day for the 9<sup>th</sup> and 10<sup>th</sup> grades before his mother moved to Detroit and he enrolled at Pershing.

The Executive Committee approved the request for waiver.

Gwinn High School (Regulation I, Section 9) – A request to waive the transfer regulation was made on behalf of an incoming 11<sup>th</sup>-grade student whose younger sister died in September 2015 as a result of injuries from an accident in the Gwinn gymnasium when the student was a freshman. Because the student struggled with the death of his younger sister (one of three triplets), the student transferred to Marquette High School for the 10<sup>th</sup> grade in 2016-17. On Aug. 24, 2016, the Executive Committee approved a waiver of the transfer rule for this student. The student was unhappy and unable to develop relationships at Marquette, and intends to reenroll at Gwinn to begin the 2017-18 school year. The family is hopeful that the year away from the scene of the death and continuing counseling will allow for a better experience at Gwinn.

The Executive Committee approved the request for waiver.

Hudsonville High School (Regulation I, Section 9) – A request to waive the transfer regulation was made on behalf of a 10<sup>th</sup>-grade student who experienced social media harassment/bullying while a student at Grand Rapids-South Christian High School.

The Executive Committee did not approve the request for waiver.

Manton High School (Regulation I, Section 9) – A request to waive the transfer regulation was made on behalf of an incoming 12<sup>th</sup>-grade student who has had an unstable home life while living with his father and attending Walled Lake Northern since April of the 9<sup>th</sup> grade in 2014-15. The student's mother died when he was seven years old and the student began living with his father in Florida. The father has moved the student several times in his life. The student sought to change custody from his father years ago but was not permitted by the courts. In February 2015, temporary guardianship was granted to a family in Manton, hoping the father would change destructive behaviors, which did not occur. The day after the temporary order expired in March 2015, the father relocated the student to Milford to reside with the father and his girlfriend. As a 17 year old, the student plans to emancipate himself and return to Manton to live with the family that once had guardianship and with whom the student had stayed many days when attending Manton. The student attended Manton Schools from 5<sup>th</sup> grade through most of 9<sup>th</sup> grade.

The Executive Committee approved the request for waiver.

Remus-Chippewa Hills High School (Regulation I, Section 9) – A request to waive the transfer regulation was made on behalf of an incoming 11<sup>th</sup>-grade student whose parents' divorce became final in February 2017. The student attended Chippewa Hills for the 9<sup>th</sup> grade and fall of the 10<sup>th</sup> grade in 2016-17. Due to custody issues, in October 2016, the student moved to her father's residence in Wyoming-Godwin Heights. Within the month, the student moved into her mother's home in Ewart and enrolled at Big Rapids. The mother had lost her home in the Chippewa Hills School District. The student, still living with her mother in Ewart for most of 2016-17, will be reenrolling at Chippewa Hills to begin the 2017-18 school year. There were unsuccessful attempts to enroll at Chippewa Hills within a brief number of days from the fourth Friday of February 2017.

The Executive Committee did not approve the request for waiver.

St. Louis High School (Regulation I, Section 9[D]) – A request to waive the transfer regulation to permit eligibility after 90 scheduled school days of enrollment was made on behalf of an incoming 10<sup>th</sup>-grade student who previously attended school in Pennsylvania and enrolled at St. Louis on March 8, 2017.

The Executive Committee approved the request for waiver following the student's 90<sup>th</sup> scheduled school day of enrollment at St. Louis High School beginning March 8, 2017.

Sparta High School (Regulation I, Section 9) – A request to waive the transfer regulation was made on behalf of an incoming 11<sup>th</sup>-grade student who enrolled at Comstock Park to begin the 10<sup>th</sup> grade because her family was intending to buy a home there. The student did not participate in girls competitive cheer in the first semester of 2016-17 due to the transfer rule and did not participate later in the school year due to positions being set on the team. Unable to find a home in Comstock Park, the family moved into another home but within the Sparta School District. The student's only sport is competitive cheer. The student attended Sparta as a 9<sup>th</sup>-grader and will be reenrolling to begin the 2017-18 school year.

The Executive Committee did not approve the request for waiver.

Traverse City Central High School (Regulation I, Section 9) – A request to waive the transfer regulation was made on behalf of an incoming 12<sup>th</sup>-grade student whose mother took a job in Traverse City in January 2017, moved with his mother into the Central attendance area and enrolled on April 16, 2017. The move is not full and complete as the older brother remained in Midland with his grandparents to graduate this spring from Midland High School. The lease on the former residence in Midland was terminated. The mother and two sons constitute the family unit.

The Executive Committee approved the request for waiver.

Traverse City Central High School (Regulation I, Section 9) – A request to waive the transfer regulation was made on behalf of 12<sup>th</sup>- and 10<sup>th</sup>-grade brothers (2017-18) whose father was laid off from his job in January 2017 and found a new position in Traverse City. The family previously lived in Romeo, have their home listed for sale and are in the process of renting a home in the Traverse City Central attendance area. The student's mother works in Romeo, is on long-term disability and may or may not return to work. It is possible that the mother will not be able to relocate with the family and, if this is the case, she will live with her parents in the Romeo School District until May 2018.

The Executive Committee approved the request for waiver.

Approved International Student Programs (AISP) – Exception 4 of Regulation I, Section 9(A) allows immediate eligibility for one academic year for an otherwise eligible international student on either a J-1 or F-1 visa who is placed in a residence in a public high school district or school service area through an MHSAA Approved International Student Program. Pursuant to Interpretation 83, the Executive Committee reviewed CSIET J-1 and F-1 inbound student programs as well as all member school-operated international student programs and determined that the following are MHSAA approved for the 2017-18 school year:

CSIET F-1 Inbound Listed Programs (See Appendix A)

CSIET J-1 Inbound Listed Programs (See Appendix B)

MHSAA Member School Programs:

- **Bloomfield Hills-Brother Rice High School** – Maximum of five (5) international students (total of J-1 and F-1 visa students) allowed to participate on varsity level interscholastic teams during the 2017-18 academic year.
- **Clarkston-Everest Collegiate High School** (through Oak International Academies) – Maximum of five (5) international students (total of J-1 and F-1 visa students) allowed to participate on varsity level interscholastic teams during the 2017-18 academic year.
- **Grand Rapids-NorthPointe Christian High School** – Maximum of five (5) international students (total of J-1 and F-1 visa students) allowed to participate on varsity level interscholastic teams during the 2017-18 academic year.
- **Grosse Pointe Woods-University Liggett School** – Maximum of five (5) international students (total of J-1 and F-1 visa students) allowed to participate on varsity level interscholastic teams during the 2017-18 academic year.
- **Jenison High School (Jenison International Academy)** – Maximum of fifteen (15) international students (total of J-1 and F-1 visa students) allowed to participate on varsity level interscholastic teams during the 2017-18 academic year.
- **Muskegon-Western Michigan Christian High School** – Maximum of five (5) international students (total of J-1 and F-1 visa students) allowed to participate on varsity level interscholastic teams during the 2018-19 academic year.

- **St. Joseph-Michigan Lutheran High School** – Maximum of five (5) international students (total of J-1 and F-1 visa students) allowed to participate on varsity level interscholastic teams during the 2017-18 academic year.
- **Traverse City Central and West High Schools** – Maximum of twenty-nine (29) international students (total of J-1 and F-1 visa students) allowed to participate on varsity level interscholastic teams during the 2017-18 academic year. Note: The 29 students would be allocated as 1% of total enrollment – a maximum of 13 students at Central High School (1,345 enrollment) and a maximum of 16 at West High School (1,582 enrollment).

Subvarsity Waiver Requests Meeting All Conditions of Section 9(B) – The Executive Committee approved immediate eligibility at the subvarsity level for the following transferring 9<sup>th</sup>- or 10<sup>th</sup>-grade students (after entering 9<sup>th</sup> grade, before completing 10<sup>th</sup> grade) **who have not previously participated in an interscholastic scrimmage or contest in any MHSAA sport at the high school level** (whether MHSAA member schools or not) and who do not qualify for one of the 15 stated exceptions to the transfer regulation and have transferred for reasons having nothing to do with athletics, discipline or family finances and would not require Executive Committee evaluation or comparison of school demographics or curriculum:

Midland-Dow High School (Regulation II, Section 11[H]) – Pursuant to Interpretation 241, a request to waive the four-player rule for the 2017-18 school year was made on behalf of a retired teacher who is the boys head coach and girls assistant swimming & diving coach and also the girls head coach of the Kronos Aquatics Club. The Kronos Aquatics Club is open to the general public ages 15-21. For 2017-18, there are 35 registered swimmers, the majority of which are from Midland and Dow High Schools. It is anticipated that the program will double in size and will be open to 8<sup>th</sup>-grade student from area middle schools. Students from Auburn, Bay City, Freeland and Saginaw are also anticipated. A similar request has been granted to the boys head coach from Dow for this same club program each year since 2014-15.

The Executive Committee approved the request for waiver for this coach for the 2017-18 school year.

Muskegon-Mona Shores, Muskegon—Reeths-Puffer, North Muskegon, Muskegon-Catholic Central and Muskegon-Western Michigan Christian High Schools (Regulation III, Section 1[D]) – The Executive Committee approved the addition of Western Michigan Christian to a cooperative program in boys and girls swimming & diving which existed previously among the other four member middle schools and Montague-NBC. NBC Middle School is withdrawing from the agreement. A corresponding high school application was also submitted. Participation will be among 6<sup>th</sup>-, 7<sup>th</sup>- and 8<sup>th</sup>-grade students.

Waterford Mott High School (Regulation V, Section 4) - On Aug. 3, 2016, the Executive Committee did not approve a request to modify the executive director's penalty for a violation of undue influence on the part of the head football coach, that he not be allowed to coach in any MHSAA tournament in any sport through the 2017-18 school year. This was in addition to the school's action to prohibit the presence of the head coach at the first preseason scrimmage and first two football games of 2016. The school submitted a rationale, asking for reconsideration of the second year playoff prohibition. The school's athletic director and head football coach spoke with the committee.

The Executive Committee did not approve the request to rescind the second and final year of what could have been a four-year penalty under the undue influence rule that the Representative Council saw the need to strengthen beginning with the 2014-15 school year.

Harbor Springs High School (Enrollment Declaration Form) – A request was made to adjust the 2017-18 Enrollment Declaration Form downward from 306 students to 289 students. Twenty-four students who attend the school alternative education program were counted but only seven of those students reside in the Harbor Springs attendance area.

The Executive Committee did not approve the request for waiver.

Transfer Rule Review – Pursuant to the informal request of the Representative Council at its May meeting, the Executive Committee reviewed and approved a process and schedule for reviewing the MHSAA Transfer Regulation.

MHSAA Multimedia Regulations – The Executive Committee approved the 2017-18 Multimedia Regulations.

Next Meetings – The next meetings of the Executive Committee are scheduled for Wednesday, Aug. 2, 2017, at 9 am in East Lansing; Wednesday, Aug. 23, 2017, at 9 am in East Lansing (all members onsite); Wednesday, Sept. 6, 2017, at 9 am in East Lansing; Wednesday, Oct. 4, 2017, at 9 am in East Lansing; Wednesday, Nov. 1, 2017, at 9 am in East Lansing; and Thursday, Nov. 30, 2017, at 1:30 pm in East Lansing (Representative Council meets next day).
