
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DOMINANCE RULES THE DAY IN 2023



Never in the history of the MHSAA Individual Wrestling Finals had more than two wrestlers won their fourth title in the same year.

In 2023, three accomplished the feat in Division 1 alone, including, for the first time ever, a pair of teammates.

Detroit Catholic Central's Dylan Gilcher and Davison's Josh Barr and Caden Horwath each won their fourth titles at Ford Field, joining an elite group that now numbers 35.

"I'm honored to be a part of that group," Barr said after his 17-5 major decision victory against Hartland's Brayden Bobo at 175 pounds.

Barr and Horwath were the fourth and fifth Cardinals to win four titles, joining Brent Metcalf (2002-05). Lincoln Olson (2012-15) and Alex Facundo (2018-21).

Horwath claimed his fourth title with a 12-2 major decision against Grosse Pointe South's Wyatt Hepner (39-7) at 126 pounds. His previous titles came at 103, 119 and 125.

"Just coming off the mat now, it feels pretty surreal," said Horwath, who finished the season 22-1.

Gilcher claimed No. 4 with a 20-4 technical fall in the second period against Travis Richards of Brighton (29-7) at 150 pounds. His previous titles came at 112, 135 and 140. He finished his senior season at 32-0.

"It feels real great," Gilcher said. "I am. I'm really glad I was first (on the team to wrestle today), because I was stressing out about my match. But now all the stress is gone and I can just cheer on my team."

Khloe Williams wasted no time securing her second career Michigan championship during 2024 at Ford Field.

It took the Clio senior only 30 seconds to post a victory by pin over Kalamazoo Loy Norrix sophomore Heaven Cole in the 170pound title match.

All four of Williams' victories in the Finals resulted in falls that took a minute or less. In fact, all 32 of her matches this season resulted in wins by pin.

"I just wanted to do that this year. I just wanted to pin everyone," said Williams, who won a Michigan Wrestling Association state title as a freshman, finished second in MWA as a sophomore and then runner-up again in the 2022 MHSAA Tournament.

Would you believe that wrestling isn't necessarily Williams' favorite sport? She's been wrestling for 13 years. She followed in older brother Kam's footsteps. He was a Finals runner-up in high school.

Softball is No. 1 for Khloe Williams now, however. She intends on playing it at Mott Community College. Williams plays center field, showing that in addition to her prowess on the mat she can also cover some ground in the outfield.

When asked if it would be difficult to give up a sport like wrestling in which she's had so much success, she just shrugged.
"Kind of, a little bit," she grinned.

"She's very humble. She just comes in the room and works hard - doesn't really have much to say. She's there every day. She puts her work in," Clio coach Tony Vance said.

Winning four MHSAA Individual Finals wrestling titles is quite an accomplishment.

Winning eight total wrestling championships is even more impressive.

But, that's becoming somewhat commonplace for the Dundee wrestling pro-

In 2023, Dundee senior Braeden Davis (41-0) became the fifth wrestler in MHSAA history to win a fourth individual wrestling state championship to go with four team state championships as he defeated Grand Rapids Catholic Central's Michael Wilson (32-4), 3-1, in the 132-pound Division 3 final.

Three of the five four-four winners have come from the Dundee program, as Davis joined Stoney Buell (2018-21) and Casey Swiderski (2019-22).

"It means a lot. I am glad and proud for myself. It's a great privilege and great accomplishment," Davis said of joining the four-time winner club. "It means a lot to (join the other two with eight titles). We trained a lot together. We all managed to succeed and get things done."

Davis hadn't seen a third round in his previous three Individual Finals weekends and still hadn't until last year. The first two rounds of the championship match were scoreless before Davis got an escape to start the third and then finally scored a takedown later in the round to go up 3-0.

"I try not to think about (winning quickly) because that can make me nervous. I just try to drown it out and not think about that," Davis said. "I just had to wrestle smart."

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
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School Spirit is Defining Difference in HS Sports

s Education-based sports in our nation's schools are Adifferent than any other level of competition.

Youth leagues and club sports often require significant entry fees, and in many cases, the focus is on competitive success with little concern for skill development, team building or sportsmanship.

High-profile college sports have been disrupted by issues concerning media contracts, NIL and the transfer portal, with the environment a bit like the "Wild West" on campuses throughout the country.

Professional sports, of course, are about the most elite performance, entertainment and winning championships.

Sports in our nation's 19,800-plus high schools instead are much more focused on education, relationships, team unity, having fun and school spirit.

School spirit is perhaps the defining difference between interscholastic and other levels of sports - having pride in one's school, maintaining a connection to the school and coaches for life, supporting all school teams and programs whether a participant or a fan, and contributing to the bond between school and community.

On an individual basis, pride is a key component of school spirit. Students who become involved in sports take pride in their teams and school and tend to carry that pride to their future careers after high school.

High school sports have the potential to boost the spirit of communities as well. There are countless examples every year but one such community was the small town of Fertile, Minnesota, located about 270 miles northwest of Minneapolis. In 2021, Jude Olson, a junior on the Fertile-Beltrami High School nine-player football team, was killed in an accident, which shook the approximately 1,000 residents of Fertile.

Last year, however, the Fertile-Beltrami football team provided a positive boost to the town with an undefeated regular season and a first-ever trip to the Minnesota State High School League Nine-player State Football Championship at U.S. Bank Stadium in Minneapolis.

According to an article in the Grand Forks (North Dakota) Herald, many of the town's residents did not have the means to make the five-hour trek to the game. As a result, local businesses and farmers donated \$25,000 for five charter buses to make sure every fan who wanted to make the trip had a free ride to the game.

"It means a lot to the whole town," said Jodie Strem, the co-owner of Fertile Oil Company. "We want (the players) to look in the stands and see us and know we are there for them. We are coming down full force."

While the Fertile-Beltrami Falcons lost to LeRoy-Ostrander in the MSHSL Nine-player Championship, the players and the 274 fans who made the journey will remember much more than the outcome of the game.

This is school spirit at its core and why high school sports are different.

High school activity programs boost the spirit of individuals, teams and communities. Research indicated that in 2020 when these programs were shut down because of the pandemic, the mental health of students was drastically compromised.

In the post-pandemic world, there are fewer face-to-face meetings. High school activities have played a major role in bringing people back together. We know that when schools have strong school spirit, communities respond with support and increased attendance.

School spirit and sportsmanship go hand in hand. If school spirit is channeled in a positive way, and expectations for good sportsmanship are communicated

and enforced by school administrators, positive fan experiences will occur.

A survey several years ago by Varsity Brands concluded that high school students with school spirit performed better academically, were more engaged in social and civic matters, and were happier in general than their less-spirited peers.

The survey indicated that the benefits of school spirit are not just confined to the school years. The study suggested that school spirit can have lasting effects, including higher aspirations for continuing education and greater success in later life.

We are pleased to report that Varsity has commissioned a new research study, which will examine the post-pandemic educational landscape and attempt to understand how the return to in-person schooling has influenced school spirit and its profound impact on student learning, leadership and personal growth. We look forward to sharing the results of this survey down the road.

As the calendar turns to 2024, it is a great opportunity to renew commitments to these programs that involve more than 12 million participants in sports and performing arts programs that foster and celebrate school spirit.

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Scholar-Athlete Class of 2024

he Michigan High School Athletic Association/Farm Bureau Insurance Scholar-Athlete Award has been recognizing the top student-athletes for 35 years. Applicants for the Scholar-Athlete Award must meet the following criteria: A minimum cumulative grade-point average of 3.5 on a 4.0 scale; and must have previously won a varsity letter. Applicants also show involvement in other school and community activities; submit two letters of recommendation and a 500-word essay on the importance of sportsmanship in educational athletics.

Recipients of the 2023-24 Scholar-Athlete Award receive a \$2,000 college scholarship to be used at the college, university, or trade school of their choice during the 2024-25 school year. This year, a total of 1,607 applications from 445 schools were received for the 32 scholarships. Class A students were guaranteed 12 winners, Class B eight winners, Class C six winners and Class D four winners. Two at-large winners were also selected.

All scholarship recipients will be honored during the MHSAA Boys Baksetball Finals at the Breslin Center in East Lansing this March.







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Student Advisory Council Aids MHSAA

The Student Advisory Council is a 16-member group which provides feedback on issues impacting educational athletics from a student's perspective, and also is involved in the operation of Association championship events and other programming. Members of the Student Advisory Council serve for two years, beginning as juniors. Eight new members are selected annually to serve on the SAC, with nominations made by MHSAA member schools. The incoming juniors will join the group of eight seniors-tobe appointed a year ago.

Those eight new members were selected from 105 applicants. That number of applicants was the fourth-most ever, with the last four years featuring the four highest totals.

The first Student Advisory Council was formed for the 2006-07 school year. With the addition of this class, members will have represented 137 schools from 50 leagues plus independent schools that do not play in a league. Combined, the new appointees have participated in 16 MHSAA sports, and all eight will be the first SAC members from their respective schools.

MHSAA Representative Council

he Representative Council of the Michigan High School Athletic Association is the body assembled to carry out the wishes of member schools. The Council meets several times annually to discuss and pass legislation concerning interscholastic athletics in Michigan.

The Representative Council is made up of 19 members, with all but five elected by a vote of MHSAA-member schools to represent different geographic regions, different sizes of schools, non-public schools, and junior and middle schools. Two members are elected to statewide at-large positions. Four members are appointed by the Council to facilitate representation of females and minorities, and the 19th position is occupied by the Superintendent of Public Instruction or his/her designee.

The officers and two other representatives form the MHSAA's Executive Committee, which meets on a monthly basis during the school year to review eligibility appeals and other current business.
